its natural springs and temperate climate. Steamboats ferried visitors to several hotels in Green Cove Springs, including the St. Elmo, Clarendon, and Oakland. Among these tourists was President Grover Cleveland, who famously had spring water sent to the White House. The peak of Clay County's tourist appeal occurred in the last three decades of the 19th century, but interest diminished later due to Henry Flagler extending the Florida East Coast Railway to destinations such as Palm Beach and Miami.

The military has significantly influenced the history of Clay County. Camp Blanding was established in 1939 at Kingsley Lake in the southwestern part of Clay County. This 28,000-acre facility was developed by the Florida National Guard and trained over 90,000 soldiers during World War II, becoming the state's fourth-largest "city." In Green Cove Springs, Lee Field served as a training hub for pilots. After the war, Lee Field transitioned to accommodate the mothball fleet. Although Lee Field was closed in the early 1960s, Camp Blanding remains active today as a military training base. Additionally, Clay County is a favored location for military personnel from nearby Duval County bases to reside. As of 2023, Clay County's population is 232,439.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - COUNTY SEAT

Green Cove Springs serves as both a city and the county seat of Clay County in Florida. Its origins trace back over 7,000 years when Native Americans settled in the region due to the allure of a warm mineral spring. This hydrological spring, referred to locally as the "Original Fountain of Youth," became a popular destination in the 19th century, leading to the establishment of more than a dozen hotels to cater to visitors in the spa town. Currently, the sulfur-scented spring water feeds into a nearby public swimming pool before it flows a short distance into the St. Johns River. The development of Green Cove Springs began in 1816 and was initiated by George J. F. Clarke, who received land through a Spanish land grant to construct a sawmill. Originally named White Sulfur Springs upon its establishment in 1854, the city was renamed in 1866 and became the county seat of Clay County in 1871.

The region's economy relied mainly on agriculture and tourism until the late 19th century, when Henry Flagler's railroad began to transport tourists further south in Florida. In 1895, the Great Freeze devastated the local citrus industry, leading to a significant decline in tourism. With the arrival of the 1920s, development resumed as automobile travel started to draw visitors back. However, the Great Depression of the 1930s marked a halt to this growth phase for the city. By the 2020 census, the population recorded was 9,786.

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS

By 1917, a small community named "Brooklyn" was situated along what is now State Road 100, about a mile north of the current site of Keystone Heights, adjacent to Lake Brooklyn. During its early existence, Brooklyn featured a large, unpainted structure known as the Brooklyn Hotel, a general store that also served as a post office, and several modest homes dispersed throughout the area. John J. Lawrence, a property developer from Pennsylvania, discovered this area while visiting Lake Brooklyn and felt an immediate attraction to the region. The Lawrence family completed the first home in Keystone Heights in 1920, overlooking Lake Geneva. This residence is still present today at the intersection of Jasmine Avenue and Lawrence Boulevard. As news spread about the region's natural beauty and numerous lakes, more families began relocating to Keystone, putting pressure on construction efforts in the burgeoning city. To help alleviate this challenge, C. Ray Lawrence arrived in Keystone Heights in late 1921 and started to plan the streets and lots in the area. The city was officially incorporated as the "City of Keystone Heights" in 1925, named in honor of Pennsylvania's nickname, the "Keystone State." According to the 2020 census, its population was 1,446.

ORANGE PARK

In 1877, the Florida Winter Home and Improvement Company established the Town of Orange Park. Following the Civil War, this company acquired several thousand acres of the McIntosh plantation at Laurel Grove to develop a southern getaway and a small agricultural community. The land was subdivided into building lots and small farm parcels, including the current street network design, featuring Kingsley Avenue and Plainfield Avenue. The town was officially incorporated in 1879 through a special legislative act in Florida. Ulysses S. Grant and Philip Sheridan visited Orange Park in January 1880, at which time a large hotel was constructed on Kingsley Avenue, complemented by a 1,200-foot pier. The local fruit-growing sector faced devastation during the Great Freeze of 1895. According to the 2020 census, the population stood at 9,089.

PENNEY FARMS

In 1922, J. C. Penney, a pioneer in the department store industry, established the community of Penney Farms, which was initially referred to as Long Branch City. Here, he designed an innovative suburban farming village. The official incorporation of the Town of Penney Farms by the state of Florida took place in 1927. The Penney Retirement Community has existed since 1926.

Following a decline in real estate and the stock market crash, Penney had to reduce his vision for a community intended for retired Christian ministers, a tribute to his father, a Baptist preacher. Currently, the Penney Retirement Community spans 192 acres, serving as a residence for both Christian laypeople and clergy members, including missionaries. According to the 2020 census, the population was recorded at 821.

LAKESIDE

Located just west of Orange Park in what is currently the Lakeside CDP, the Yerkes Regional Primate Research Center was formerly one of ten regional centers dedicated to primate research. Established in 1930 by psychologist Robert Yerkes in collaboration with Yale University and the Rockefeller Foundation, it became the United States' first laboratory dedicated to the study of non-human primates. Before the center's inauguration, Yerkes conducted his studies involving two great apes, known as "Chim" and "Panzee". His research persuaded officials from Yale University, the Rockefeller Foundation, and the Carnegie Foundation to support the establishment of the Florida facility. Originally intended to accommodate around 25 chimpanzees, the lab, throughout its 35 years of operation, engaged with approximately 65 chimps or possibly more. Among its residents were chimpanzees raised in human-like environments, such as Gua and Viki, along with other primates acquired from the estate of Madame Rosalia Abreu in Havana, Cuba. The center attracted some of the era's leading behavioral scientists, who had mixed feelings about living in the humid Southern climate. These researchers examined a range of topics related to primate behavior, covering areas like basic biology, sensory functions, reproductive systems, behavioral patterns, physiology, and anatomy. Interestingly, residents from Orange Park circulated rumors about scientists attempting to cross-breed humans with apes. Consequently, some locals, likely aware of the lab's history, have referred to the facility as a "Monkey Farm." According to the 2020 census, the population of the area stood at 31,275.

FLEMING ISLAND

Fleming Island, located in Florida, was founded by Irish immigrant George Fleming (1760-1821), who the Spanish governor of East Florida granted a 1,000-acre tract of land in recognition of his military service. In 1790, he created a plantation named "Hibernia," derived from the Latin term for Ireland, situated in what is now known as Hibernia, Florida. Upon his death in 1821, the plantation was bequeathed to his son, Colonel Lewis Michael Fleming (1798-1862). In 1942, the area was still largely undeveloped when the U.S. Navy built four asphalt runways there, establishing a Naval Outlying Field known as NOLF Fleming Island, which served as an auxiliary airfield for Naval Air Station Jacksonville. However, by the 1960s, as jet aircraft became prevalent at nearby NAS Jacksonville and NAS Cecil Field, the Navy abandoned the auxiliary airfield due to its runways being inadequate for the new aircraft. Ultimately, in the late 1990s, the deteriorating runways were torn down to facilitate new residential construction. According to the 2020 census, the population of the Fleming Island Census Designated Place (CDP) was 29,142.

OAKLEAF PLANTATION

Established in 2002 by the Hutson Companies, Oakleaf Plantation is a 6,400-acre community designed in Clay County. A portion extends into Jacksonville's Duval County limits. As of the 2020 census, the population stood at 31,034.

CRESCENT CITY

Non-indigenous settlers established Crescent City in 1852, initially referring to it as the "Old Oliver Plantation." It wasn't until 1876 that the area was officially named "Crescent City." The city attained official municipal sta-

tus in 1883, followed by its incorporation as a city two years later in 1885. A notable resident, A. Philip Randolph, the founder of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, was born in Crescent City in 1889. He emerged as a significant leader in the civil rights movement during the 1950s and 1960s. Randolph Street in Crescent City bears his name in honor of his contributions. According to the 2020 Census, the city's population stood at 1.654.

PALATKA

The origins of today's Palatka community can be traced back to a European-American settlement founded in 1821. Following Florida's acquisition by the United States in that same year, Nehemiah Brush set up a ferry across the river. He purchased a 1,200-acre parcel of land in 1826, acquiring another similarly sized tract the following year. Acknowledging the site's crucial role in controlling the St. Johns River, the primary route into Central Florida, the US Army established Fort Shannon in 1838, named in honor of Captain Samuel Shannon. This fort included a garrison, a supply depot, and a hospital. By 1842, the majority of the Seminole people had relocated to Indian Territory, leading to the Army's abandonment of Fort Shannon in 1843. Settlers utilized the military structures, including eight blockhouses and piers, to build the town. By 1847, Palatka was experiencing significant growth. The county of Putnam was established in 1849, with Palatka designated as the county seat. With assistance from Judge Isaac H. Bronson, the town was officially incorporated as a city on January 8, 1853. According to the census conducted in 202, the population was recorded as 10,446.

INTERLACHEN

The arrival of the Florida Southern Railway in the 1870s opened the region to settlers, who referred to it as "Blue Pond." Economic growth occurred as the town emerged as a winter resort and an area for citrus cultivation. Officially, the Town of Interlachen became a municipality in 1888. According to the 2020 census, the population stood at 1.441.

Bag & Length Limits

ONE DAY BAG LIMITS FOR FRESHWATER GAME FISH:

- **5** Black Bass (including largemouth, suwannee, spotted, choctaw & shoal bass, individually or in total), only one of which may be 16 inches or longer in total length. There is no minimum length limit for largemouth bass.
- * No person shall kill or possess any Suwannee, shoal, spotted, or Choctaw bass that is less than 12 inches in total length.
- * Chipola River and its tributaries: No person shall kill or possess shoal bass on the Chipola River or its tributaries. Any shoal bass that are caught must be released immediately.
- **20** Striped Bass, white bass, & sunshine bass (individually or in total), of which only 6 may be 24 inches or longer in total length. * In the Suwannee River, areas north & west of the Suwannee River, & in any tributary, creek or stream of the Suwannee River: the bag limit for striped bass is 3, each of which must be at least 18 inches in total length (20 fish combined bag limit).
- * In the lower Ochlockonee River (downstream of the Jackson Bluff dam to Ochlockonee Bay): the bag limit for striped bass is 3, only one of which may be 24 inches or longer in total length. There is no minimum length limit (20 fish combined bag limit).

50 Panfish including bluegill, redear sunfish (shellcracker), flier, longear sunfish, mud sunfish, shadow bass, spotted sunfish (stumpknocker), warmouth & redbreast sunfish, individually or in total.

25 Crappie (speckled perch).

2 Butterfly Peacock Bass, only one of which may be 17 inches or longer in total length.

10 Alabama Shad, american shad, hickory shad, & blueback herring (individually or in total), which may only be taken with hook & line gear.

25 American Eels, must be nine inches or greater in total length. The recreational bag limit for american eels is 25 per angler per day. Wholesale/retail purchase exemption. Recreational anglers purchasing american eel as bait may possess more than the legal bag limit provided that the eels were purchased from a licensed dealer.



Beach Flagens
