FOND DU LAC COUNTY HISTORY



Once home to Winnebago Indian tribes, Fond du Lac County was settled in the 1830s and established in 1836. By 1850 the area was organized and communities were founded as pioneers were attracted to the ample timber, fertile soil and water supply. The City of Fond du Lac was selected as the county seat and the area continued to thrive. Railroad development allowed for dramatic growth and early industry was led by agriculture and lumbering. By 1900 its population had reached 47,589 and the area continued to prosper. Today Fond du Lac County is home to approximately 100,070 residents.

FOND DU LAC COUNTY COMMUNITIES

CAMPBELLSPORT

Once known as Crouchville, Campbellsport was settled in 1846. The community was renamed after Stuart Campbell, a local landowner in 1873. Streets were platted by Jacob Haessly and as rail lines were built, the area continued to grow. Lumberyards, mills, implement shops, general stores and specialty shops were thriving by 1880. In 1903 Campbellsport and nearby New Cassel were consolidated and the community has continued to grow. Today Campbellsport is home to approximately 1,950 residents.

FOND DU LAC (COUNTY SEAT)

Fond du Lac, French for farthest end of the lake, was originally a trading post. Ample natural resources and access to water attracted pioneers and the area was quickly settled. Streets were platted by Judge Duty in 1835 and by 1850 its population had reached 1,100. As the railroad arrived in 1852 Fond du Lac developed dramatically as passengers and goods were easily transported. The community was selected as the county seat and churches and schools were constructed to meet the growing needs of its residents, including famous resident King Camp Gillette who invented the safety razor. Today Fond du Lac is home to approximately 42,424 residents.

RIPON

Settlers arrived to the Ripon area in 1844 and were part of a failed utopian socialist experiment led by Warren Chase. The community was called Ceresco and Captain David Mapes purchased land in 1849 to establish the village of Ripon. The two communities merged in 1853 and were incorporated in 1858, adopting its name after Ripon, England. Today Ripon is home to approximately 7,479 residents.

WAUPUN

First settled by Seymour Wilcox in 1839. The area was first known as Madrid but was changed to Wabun, a Native American word meaning rising sun in the east. A postal spelling error led to its current spelling in 1851 and a state penitentiary was constructed the following year. The area grew dramatically upon the arrival of the railroad, became a center for commerce and industry and has continued to thrive. Today Waupun is home to approximately 10,480 residents.

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WINNEBAGO COUNTY HISTORY



Once home to Winnebago, Fox and Menominee Indian tribes, Winnebago County was settled in the 1830s and organized in 1840. Settlers were attracted to the fertile soil, access to water and ample natural resources. In 1842 Oshkosh was selected as the county seat and development of the railroad allowed for dramatic growth. Early industry was led by commercial fishing, lumbering and agriculture. By 1900 its population had reached 58,225 and the area continued to prosper, growing to 76,622 in 1930. Today Winnebago County is home to approximately 163,370 residents.

WINNEBAGO COUNTY COMMUNITIES

MENASHA

Ample timber, access to water and fertile soil attracted settlers to the Menasha area in the 1840s. The community was originally part of Neenah until 1855 when the two towns were split and was named after an Indian word for island. Early industry was led by lumbering and the Menasha Wooden Ware Company was one of the largest producers of wooden products in 1872. Today Menasha is home to approximately 16,664 residents.

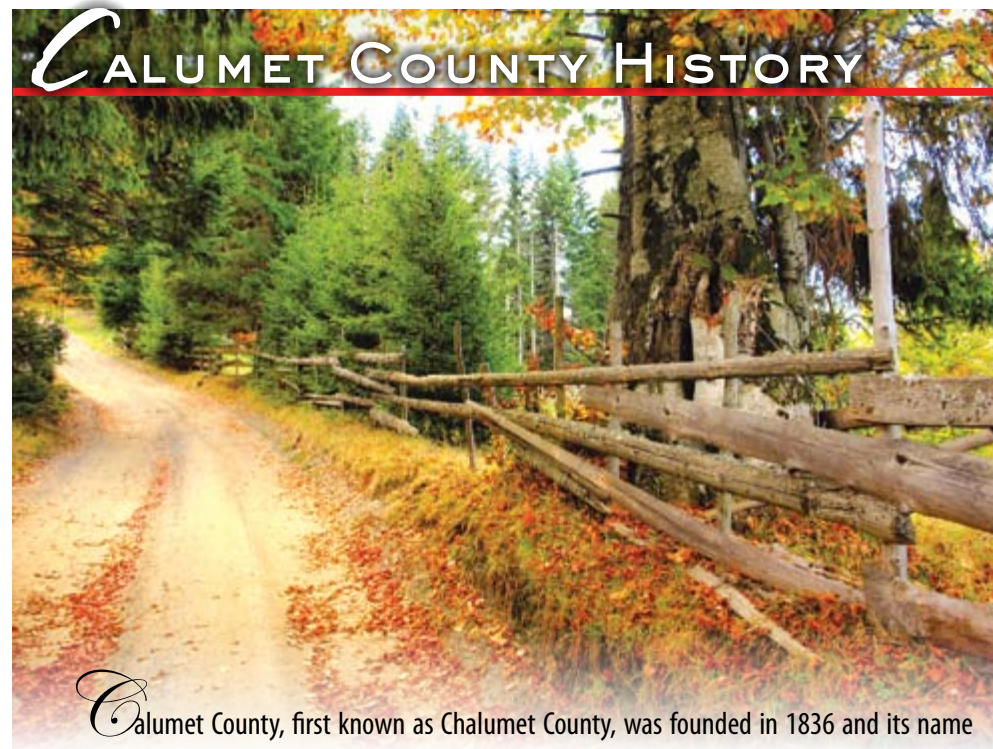
NEENAH

Neenah, an Indian word for water, was settled in 1835 and named by Judge Doty. The Fox River supplied power and mills were established along the shores. Industry was dominated by lumbering and agriculture. As transportation continued to improve, Neenah continued to develop. It is known as the birthplace of George Edwin Bergstrom, an architect who designed the Pentagon. Today Neenah is home to approximately 25,470 residents.

OSHKOSH (COUNTY SEAT)

Oshkosh, an Indian word for claw and named after Chief Oshkosh, was settled in the 1830s. The community was incorporated in 1853 and selected as the county seat. Industry was dominated by lumbering and railroad expansion allowed for dramatic growth. By 1890 its population had reached 22,840 and the area continued to develop. In 1895 OshKosh B'Gosh was founded and originally produced work clothing for adults and grew to be known for its world famous children's clothing. Today Oshkosh is home to approximately 63,701 residents.

CALUMET COUNTY HISTORY



Calumet County, first known as Chalumet County, was founded in 1836 and its name was derived from the Indian word for Pipe of Peace. Indian Reservations were established throughout the area and as farms were established, communities were formed. Access to Lake Winnebago, fertile soil and ample natural resources attracted many residents and by 1860 its population had reached 7,895. Early industry was led by agriculture and manufacturing and the area continued to grow. Today Calumet County is home to approximately 48,971 residents.

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CHILTON (COUNTY SEAT)

Chilton, originally known as Stantonville, was settled in 1845 by Moses Stanton. Stanton constructed a sawmill which began to draw new residents and in 1853 the community was organized and renamed Chillington. Its name was then shortened to Chilton and the community was selected as the county seat and incorporated in 1877. Schools, churches and businesses were established which included a newspaper office, fire department, hotels, manufacturing shops, breweries, flour mills, general stores and specialty shops. Today Chilton is home to approximately 3,708 residents.

HARRISON

Harrison was first known as Lima when it was established in 1853. As the area began to grow, its name was changed to Harrison in 1858 and the first town hall was constructed in 1868. Railroad expansion allowed for development and its proximity to Lake Winnebago attracted many new residents. Today Harrison is home to approximately 10,839 residents.

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Outagamie was founded in 1850 and is located in the east-central part of Wisconsin. The County Seat is Appleton, WI. The early settlers of the area were the Menomonee, Outagamie & Winnebago tribes. Today Outagamie County is home to approximately 177,155 residents.

APPLETON (COUNTY SEAT)

Located in Outagamie, Calumet & Winnebago Counties. Originally a trading post, Appleton was established as the Lawrence Institute. It was founded in 1847 and the community was named after Samuel Appleton, an early resident who donated \$10,000 to the college. Appleton is the County Seat of Outagamie. Businesses included paper mills, hotels, general stores and the community continued to grow. Appleton is now known as being the residence of the famous magician Harry Houdini in the 1880s. Today Appleton is home to approximately 70,897 residents.

KAUKAUNA

This area was established in 1885. It was formerly known as "The Lion on the Fox." Kaukauna is one of the oldest towns in Wisconsin. The establishment of a hydroelectric plant to fuel the cities industry gave the town the new nickname "The Electric City." Today Kaukauna is home to approximately 15,462 residents.

NEW LONDON

New London was founded in 1851. Within the city and surrounding the city are 900 acres of parks, trails and recreational areas. New London is considered one of the fastest growing cities in Outagamie County. New London sits on both the Wolf and Embarrass Rivers making it a destination for boaters and fishermen. Today New London is home to approximately 7,295 residents.



ICE SAFETY GUIDELINES:



Did you know?

- Ice always forms unevenly. It can be 2 feet thick in one spot, and just a few inches thick a couple feet away.
- The most dangerous ice is formed over flowing water. It's especially dangerous near streams, culverts and bridges. Also, the faster the water is running, usually means the weaker the ice will be.
- Snow insulates the ice and slows the freezing process. The added weight of the snow reduces the strength of the ice. Also, ice that is closer to shore is usually weaker than ice farther out.
- Cracking and rumbling ice isn't always bad. The ice expands and contracts as the temperature rises and falls.
- Fish and birds/wildlife can also effect the ice. Schools of fish can bring warm water from the bottom of lakes, and open holes in seemingly thick ice.

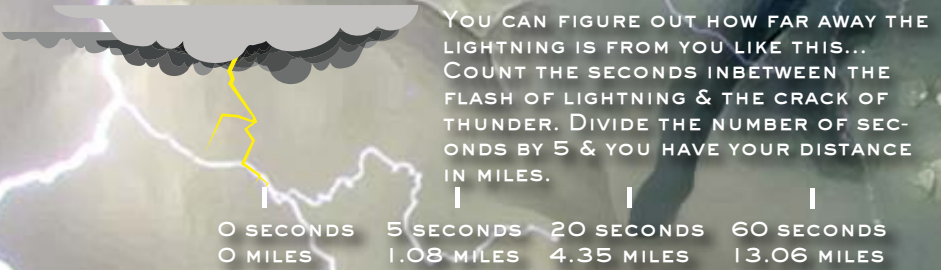

HUNTING SAFETY



All hunters should consider taking an advanced hunter education class to learn the latest hunting techniques along with tips on coming home alive.

Here are 5 Suggestions for a safe and successful hunting experience:

1. Get a detailed map of the area you are hunting, review it before you leave, and carry it with you in the field.
2. Carry a compass and know how to use it. Decide ahead of time the direction to head for if you get lost or disoriented.
3. Weather can change quickly, so hunters should carry a simple survival kit and be prepared for an unexpected overnight stay in the field. The survival kit should contain a rope, a knife, water, waterproof matches, an emergency shelter, and first aid supplies.
4. If you are on the water, make sure to wear a personal flotation device (life preserver).
5. Know your hunting partners' physical and emotional limitations, as well as your own, and don't push your partners or yourself beyond those limits.

Read the owner's manual

- and know your vehicle thoroughly.
- Check your vehicle before you ride.
- Wear protective equipment and clothing.
- Don't lend your vehicle to unskilled riders.
- Supervise young or inexperienced riders.
- Never carry a passenger on vehicles meant for one rider.
- Do not operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Drive at speeds that are appropriate to trail conditions.
- Stay to the right on trails.
- Stay away from thin ice, open water and wetlands
- Know the weather forecast.
- Make sure headlights and taillights work properly.
- Maintain safe distances between other riders.
- Reduce your speed when riding at night.
- Yield to other motor vehicles and trail users.
- Young or beginning riders are encouraged to take a safety training course.

Know Your ATV

Drink lots of Water!

- Always wear a properly fitting bike helmet as most serious injuries are to the head.
- Be sure your handlebars, seat and wheels fit snugly.
- Keep your bike in good shape by checking and oiling your chain, making sure your brakes work properly and maintaining your tire pressure.
- Always ride with both hands on the handlebars except when doing turn signals.
- When leaving a driveway, curb or alleyway always stop and check for traffic in both directions.
- Cross only at intersections.
- Use the crosswalk to walk your bike across busy intersections and follow the traffic signals.
- Never ride against traffic. Travel in the same direction as the cars.
- Whenever you can, use bike routes and avoid busy streets.
- Don't ride near parked cars as doors can open and cause accidents.
- Obey all traffic signs and traffic lights.
- When biking with friends, ride in a single file.
- Always pass other bikers or pedestrians on the left and say "On your left!" to make your presence known.
- Always use bicycle hand signals to alert traffic of your changing direction.

Be Cautious of Other Bikers

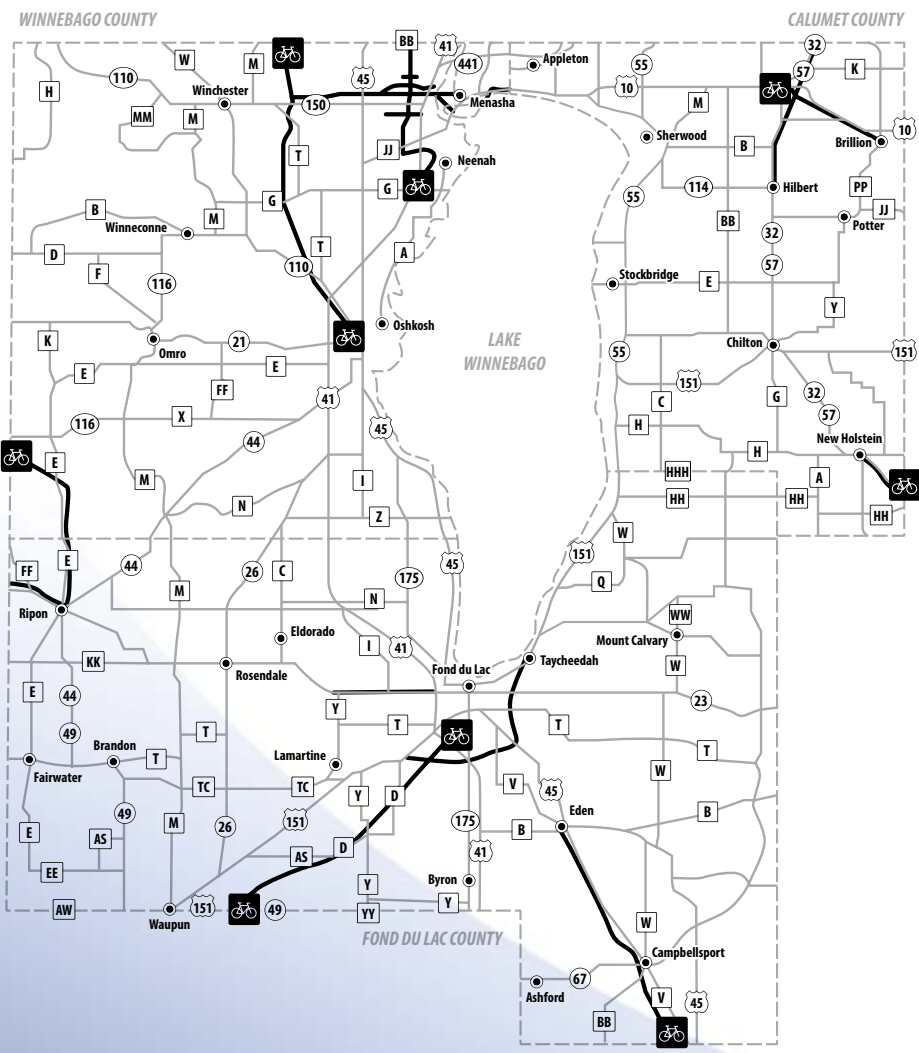
- Please respect private property and no trespassing signs.
- Stay on trails.
- Exercise extreme caution on all lakes and streams. Obey all state and local laws and ordinances. Do not operate snowmobiles/ATV's on county roads or state highways.

- Do not consume alcohol or take drugs prior to or during your snowmobile trip. Doing so increases your chances of injury or death.
- Slow down and don't cut to the inside of the trail corners. It's dangerous and illegal.
- If you snowmobile at night, don't override your lights.
- Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone.
- Drowning is one of the causes of many snowmobile fatalities. Whenever possible, avoid the ice.
- Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for operating a snowmobile.
- Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and other debris.
- Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile.
- Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before.
- Know the weather forecast, especially the ice and snow conditions.
- Be sure your snowmobile is in top-notch mechanical condition throughout the months of use.
- Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving. Thoroughly read the manual that accompanies the snowmobile.
- Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. That is not the conduct of a sportsman. Report such violations to the nearest law enforcement officer.

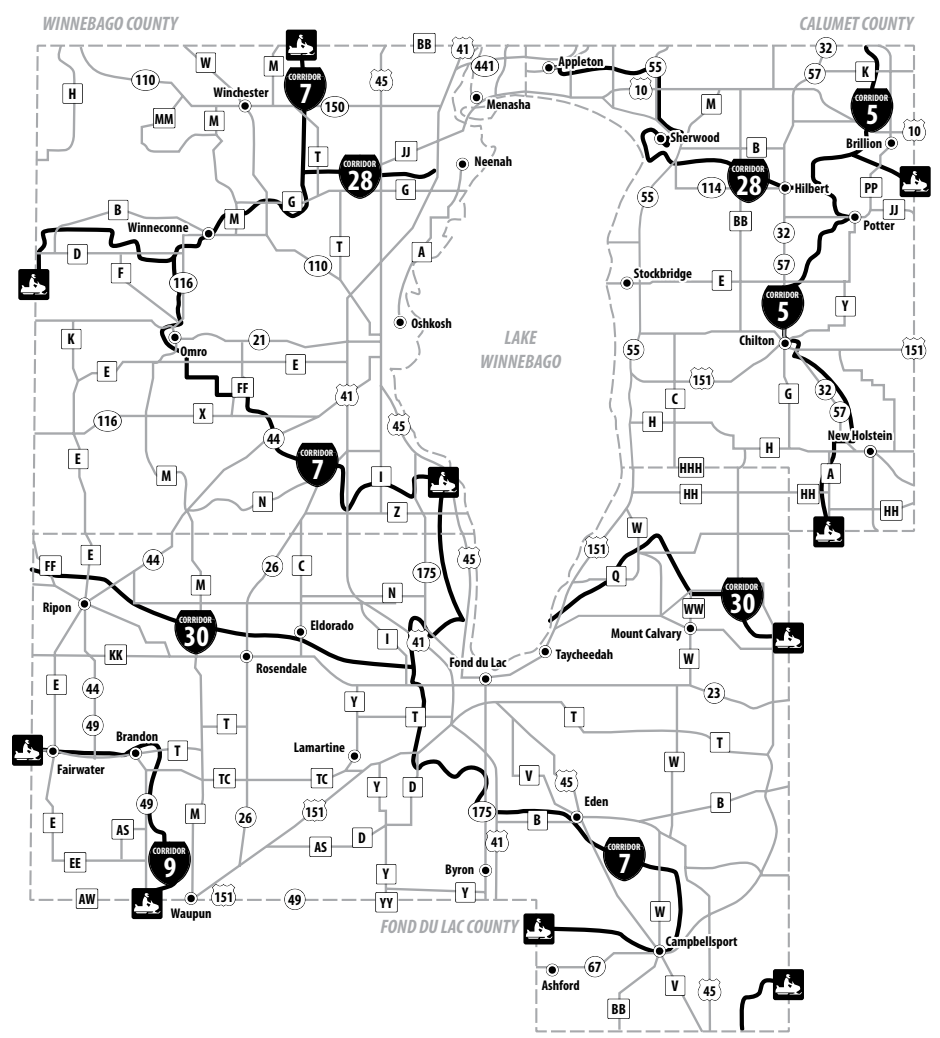

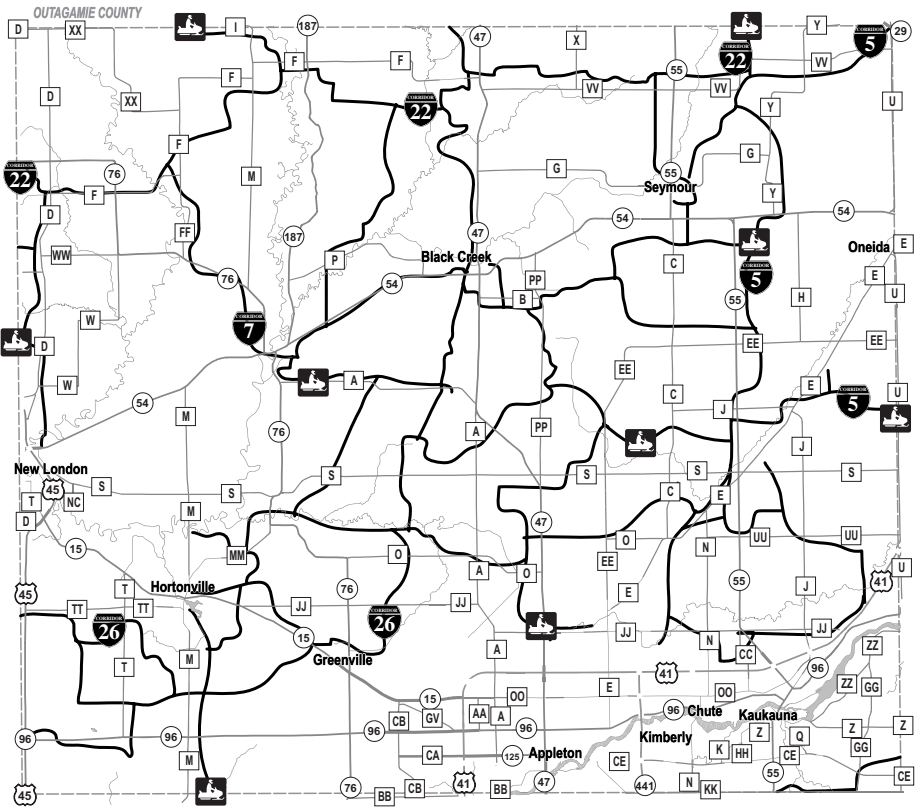

Did You Know?

- Waupun is a Native American word meaning “dawn of the day.”
- Calumet is named after a Native American ceremonial pipe with the same name.
- Oshkosh is named after Menominee Chief Oshkosh, whose name translates to “claw.”
- Outagamie is named after the Fox Tribe, also known as “dwellers of the other shore.”
- Neenah gets its name from the Winnebago word for “water” or “running water.”
- The world’s first hamburger, a flattened-meatball sandwich, was served at the Seymour Fair in 1885. The world’s largest hamburger was also served in Seymour one hundred and four years later in 1989. Seymour’s hamburger history is commemorated with the Hamburger Hall of Fame and the annual Burger Fest.
- The Republican Party was founded in Ripon as a result of citizens’ opposition to the 1854 Kansas-Nebraska Act. They chose the name Republican to associate themselves with the Declaration of Independence. A modern Republican think tank is named The Ripon Society.
- When Winneconne was mistakenly left off the official Wisconsin road map in 1967, a secret committee arranged for the town to secede. The town was an independent state with its own president and prime minister for one day before rejoining Wisconsin again. The annual Sovereign State Day festival commemorates the event.
- New London hosts Wisconsin’s biggest St. Patrick’s Day parade, along with an Irish Festival, and is renamed New Dublin during the week of St. Patrick’s Day festivities.
- America’s first hydro-electric station debuted in Appleton in 1882 and powered a paper factory and the Hearthstone House, the world’s first hydro-electric powered home.
- America’s first baseball team was organized in Black Creek in 1869.
- Appleton was the first Wisconsin town to have a telephone.
- Carrie Chapman Catt, President of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, was born in Ripon.
- Edward Schildhauer, chief engineer on the Panama Canal project, is from New Holstein.
- George Bergstrom, the designer of The Pentagon, was born in Neenah.
