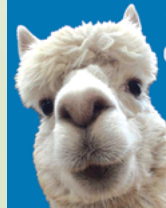

Green Lake County History



First inhabited by Natives from the Winnebago tribe, Green Lake county started out as rolling plains as far as the eye could see. Strawberry bushes were plentiful during the early years, along with wild game and rich soil. Turkeys, pheasants, prairie chickens, as well as deer and the occasional moose and buffalo roamed the plains. The earliest settlers made houses out of sticks and used clay/saplings to make chimneys. They would also use old newspapers to fill in the cracks between the sticks on the walls. Founded in 1858 and named after Green Lake, Green Lake County takes up 380 sq miles and is home to around 19,100 people.

Green Lake County Communities

Berlin

Incorporated in 1857, Berlin was originally called "Strong's Landing" after it's first settler, Nathan H. Strong in 1845. Named after the capital of Prussia, Berlins first post office was built in 1948. Two years later a school house was built, and a year after that, the first church. During World War I, anti-German sentiment was sweeping through the nation. The residents pronounced the town "Bear-lin" to distance any resemblance to the German Capitol. Berlin is now home to around 5,524 people.

Green Lake (County Seat)

The city of Green Lake, located on the North side of Big Green Lake, is not to be confused with the town of Green Lake, located on the South side of the lake. Known for its summer tourism, Green Lake has great fishing, camping, biking, hiking, golfing, swimming and many other outdoor activities. It is now home to around 960 people.

Markesan

It is said that Markesan was once the 3rd richest city in all the U.S.. Beautiful Victorian homes still stand, to this day, as proof. The first settler, Miller Seward, came to the area in 1843 and bought 300 acres of land. A year later he was joined by his brother William and father John Seward who also bought 300 acres. They built the first framed house, a sturdy one, and it's still standing. Located at 80 Manchester Street, it is the oldest building in the city. John also built a sawmill and gristmill that were eventually turned into a flouring mill. Originally called Granville, the town had to change its name. There was already a town called Granville, located 15 miles north of Milwaukee. So the name was changed to Markesan to avoid postal problems. It is now home to about 1,476 people.

Princeton

On March 4, 1920, the village trustees passed a resolution to become a city of the fourth class. After that, the resolution was approved by the state and Princeton became a city. The city was named after Princeton, Massachusetts. The Fox River flows through the city, dividing the city into an east half and west half. The city's post office has been in operation since 1849. The city also has the largest outdoor flea market in Wisconsin. It is now home to around 1,214.

Marquette County Communities

Montello (County Seat)

First claimed in 1849 by Josiah H. Dartt, Montello means “mountain or hill – and – water.” Jason Daniels was the first settler in the area though. He built a stick house with a piece of carpet for a door, elm bark for roofing and brought his wife there. It is said that Mrs. Daniels was the first white woman across the Fox River. The next summer they had lots of visitors to their humble house. That summer, Mr. Daniels helped build 20 plus houses for new settlers. In the summer of 1850 a dam was built and a sawmill put into operation. Montello is also known for its granite. Montello granite is some of the hardest and most durable granite in the world. It was used for General Ulysses S. Grant’s sarcophagus and was chosen over many others for its durability. Montello is now home to around 1,495 residents.

Packwaukee

Native Americans lived on what is now called Packwaukee for thousands of years. It was named after a friendly chief of the Ho-Chunk tribe Pakwa We, meaning “it is shallow.” Packwaukee is along Buffalo Lake with a depth today of only 9 feet in its deepest area. Packwaukee was an important stop for barges and steam ships that hauled people, mail and products along Fox River. Today Packwaukee is home to around 2,574 residents.

Originally inhabited by Natives, Marquette County is known as “Indian Lands.” The Winnebagoes and Menominees were the prominent tribes in the area and had quite the rivalry with each other. Much of the area is filled with arrowheads, spears and old Native American cookware. Near Buffalo Lake, the Natives built mounds in the shapes of various animals. Lizards, birds and turtles are just a few examples. They also built long straight mounds that are believed to be some sort of defense from rival tribes. In January 1884, Marquette county was organized for county purposes. Today it has a total land mass of 464 sq miles and is home to around 15,500 people.

Waushara County Communities

Berlin

Incorporated in 1857, Berlin was originally called "Strong's Landing" after its first settler, Nathan H. Strong in 1845. Named after the capital of Prussia, Berlin's first post office was built in 1948. Two years later a school house was built, and a year after that, the first church. During World War I, anti-German sentiment was sweeping through the nation. The residents pronounced the town "Bear-lin" to distance any resemblance to the German Capitol. Berlin is now home to around 5,524 people.

Wautoma (County Seat)

Wautoma started as a place of rest. In 1848, George Atkins let weary travelers rest in his log cabin while they traveled the Pinery Road. The next spring he sold the cabin to John Shumway who, later, turned it into The Wautoma Hotel. Ever since, the town has grown and flourished. It holds a total land mass of 2.72 sq. miles and is home to around 2,218 people.

Originating from a Native American word meaning "Good Land," Waushara county was established in 1851. Sacramento was the original county seat but was changed to Wautoma in 1854 after a bitter debate. It has a total land mass of 637 sq. miles and is home to around 25,000 people.

TICKS

Diseases & Prevention



You can get a tickborne disease if you are bitten by a tick that is infected • Tickborne diseases are increasing throughout the United States. • Personal protection methods can help reduce the odds of a tick bite while enjoying the outdoors

Some symptoms of a tickborne disease

- Many tickborne diseases have similar symptoms
- Symptoms usually show up within 2-4 weeks of being bitten

Watch for symptoms like:

- Rash
- Fever
- Headache
- Fatigue
- Muscle or joint aches



Tick Removal



Prompt tick removal is important. Use tweezers to grasp the tick close to its mouth. Gently and slowly pull the tick straight outward. Do not squeeze the ticks' body. Wash the area and apply an antiseptic to the bite. Watch for early signs and symptoms of a tickborne disease. Don't use folk remedies like Petroleum Jelly or a burnt match.

- 1-Know when and where you're at risk
 - Primarily Mid-May through Mid-July
 - Wooded and brushy areas – Blacklegged Tick
 - Grassy or wooded areas – American Dog Tick
- 2-Wear EPA-registered tick repellent
 - DEET 20-30% on skin or clothing
 - Permethrin 0.5% on clothing
- 3-Check yourself for ticks
 - Shower after being outdoors
 - Check at least once a day
 - Remove ticks ASAP!

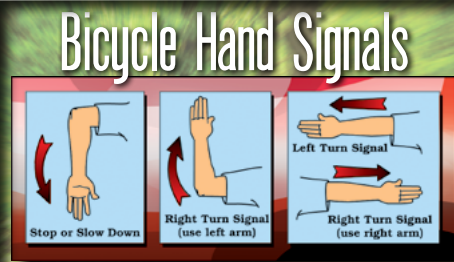

Be Aware of your Surroundings

- Always wear a properly fitting bike helmet as most serious injuries are to the head.
- Be sure your handlebars, seat and wheels fit snugly.
- Keep your bike in good shape by checking and oiling your chain, making sure your brakes work properly and maintaining your tire pressure.
- Always ride with both hands on the handlebars except when doing turn signals.
- When leaving a driveway, curb or alleyway always stop and check for traffic in both directions.
- Cross only at intersections.
- Use the crosswalk to walk your bike across busy intersections and follow the traffic signals.
- Never ride against traffic. Travel in the same direction as the cars.
- Whenever you can, use bike routes and avoid busy streets.
- Don't ride near parked cars as doors can open and cause accidents.
- Obey all traffic signs and traffic lights.
- When biking with friends, ride in a single file.
- Always pass other bikers or pedestrians on the left and say "On your left!" to make your presence known.
- Always use bicycle hand signals to alert traffic of your changing direction.



Drink lots of Water!



Know Your ATV

Read the owner's manual and know your vehicle thoroughly.

- Check your vehicle before you ride.
- Wear protective equipment and clothing.
- Don't lend your vehicle to unskilled riders.
- Supervise young or inexperienced riders.
- Never carry a passenger on vehicles meant for one rider.
- Do not operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Drive at speeds that are appropriate to trail conditions.
- Stay to the right on trails.
- Stay away from thin ice, open water and wetlands.
- Know the weather forecast.
- Make sure headlights and taillights work properly.
- Maintain safe distances between other riders.
- Reduce your speed when riding at night.
- Yield to other motor vehicles and trail users.
- Young or beginning riders are encouraged to take a safety training course.

- Do not consume alcohol or take drugs prior to or during your snowmobile trip. Doing so increases your chances of injury or death.
- Slow down and don't cut to the inside of the trail corners. It's dangerous and illegal.
- If you snowmobile at night, don't override your lights.
- Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone.
- Drowning is one of the causes of many snowmobile fatalities. Whenever possible, avoid the ice.
- Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for operating a snowmobile.
- Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and other debris.
- Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile.
- Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before.
- Know the weather forecast, especially the ice and snow conditions.
- Be sure your snowmobile is in top-notch mechanical condition throughout the months of use.
- Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving. Thoroughly read the manual that accompanies the snowmobile.
- Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. That is not the conduct of a sportsman. Report such violations to the nearest law enforcement officer.

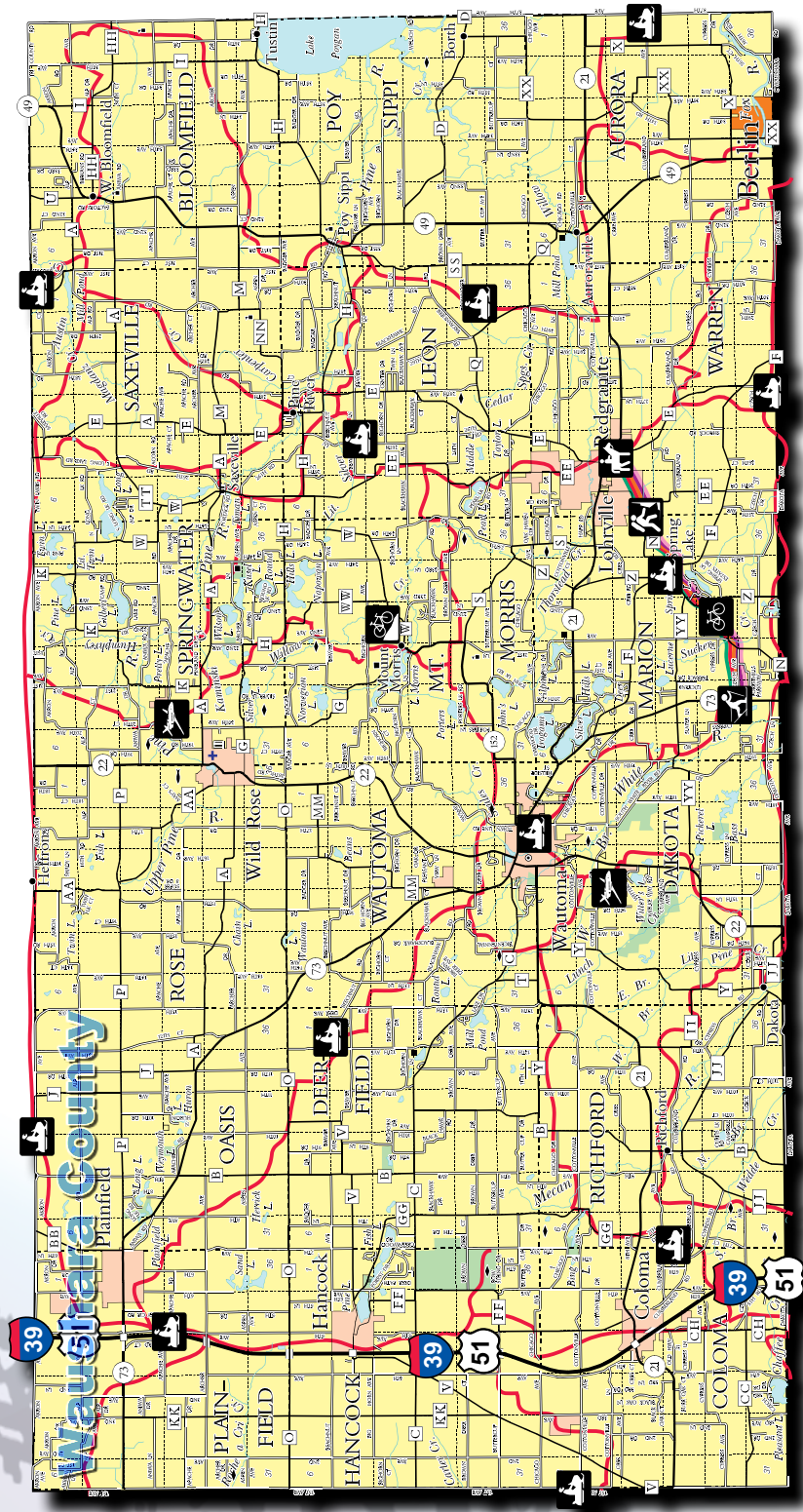
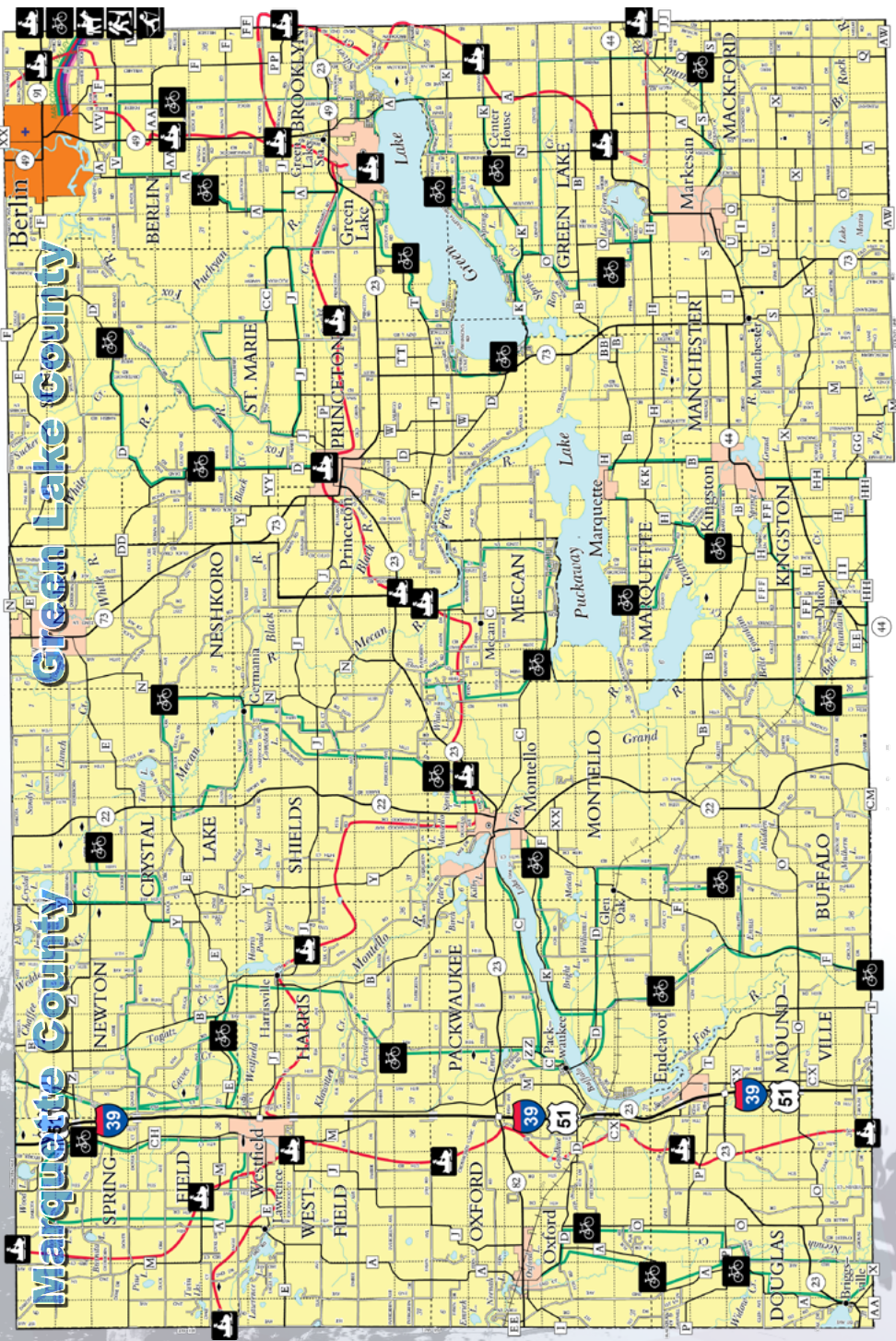

So, You have decided to get a pet... NOW WHAT??

If you have just rescued / adopted a new fur baby, please it is important to remember the 3-3-3 RULE:

3 Days:

In the first 3 days being in its new home, they will be feeling overwhelmed, scared & unsure of what is going on. They may also be uncomfortable being "themselves", and may not want to eat or drink. They may want to "shut down" or hide under a bed or in a crate, and they will test boundaries.

3 Weeks:

At this point, they may be a lot more comfortable & settling in. Learning a new routine can be overwhelming, so please be patient. By now they may have figured out the new environment & accepted that this may be their FURever home. Their personality traits will start to show, as well as any behavior issue that may be present.

3 Months:

For most fur babies, 3 months is enough time to finally be comfortable and begin to build trust and a true bond. A sense of security may be present & a set routine will help this process.

Please know that this is not the rule with every rescued or adopted pet, as some may need 6 months to a year to adjust & adapt, depending on MANY factors. Age of animal, what type of an environment did they come from?

INGREDIENTS

2 steaks (ribeye or sirloin are good choices)

INSTRUCTIONS

1 Take the steaks out of the refrigerator and let them come to room temperature for about 30 minutes. This helps the steak cook more evenly.

8 Place the baking sheet in the oven and cook for about 5-7 minutes for medium-rare doneness, or longer if you prefer your steak more well-done.

9 Remove the steaks from the oven and let them rest for a few minutes before slicing.

10 Serve the steak with any remaining butter from the baking sheet and fresh herbs if desired.

Bird Feeder Care Tips

With the return of summer means the return of a variety of bird species. If you plan on providing food, there are a few things to keep in mind.



According to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, birds may become sick from moldy bird food and uncleaned bird feeders. This tends to happen in spring more often because of the rain and humidity. If there is mold growth, it can cause an avian disease called aspergillosis, which can disrupt a birds respiratory system. Birds can also get Salmonella from unclean feeders. Either of the diseases may kill the bird.

You should wash your bird feeders a few times every year to ensure their is no mold growth. You can do this with some bleach and water (one part bleach to nine parts water), just make sure to rinse and dry well. If you can, let it dry in the sun to help kill off any left over bacteria. This also applies to hummingbird feeders but, they should be cleaned weekly.

You also need to clean up the fallen seeds and hulls from the ground under the bird feeders to prevent moldy conditions. The seeds on the ground have a tendency of attracting some animals you may not want around like mice, voles, raccoons and bears.

When buying a bird feeder you should look for one with as much air flow as possible. Look for hopper-type feeders or fly-through feeders that provide good air flow. Another way to help keep the bird seed dry is by filling the bird feeder less and more often.
