

70ND DU LAC COUNTY HISTORY



Ance home to Winnebago Native Americans, Fond du Lac County was settled in the 1830s and established in 1836. By 1850 the area was organized and communities were founded as pioneers were attracted to the ample timber, fertile soil and water supply. The City of Fond du Lac was selected as the county seat and the area continued to thrive. Railroad development allowed for dramatic growth and early industry was led by agriculture and lumbering. By 1900 its population had reached 47,589 and the area continued to prosper. Today Fond du Lac County is home to approximately 104,154 residents.

70ND DU LAC COUNTY COMMUNITIES

CAMPBELLSPORT

Once known as Crouchville, Campbellsport was settled in 1846. The community was renamed after Stuart Campbell, a local landowner in 1873. Streets were platted by Jacob Haessly and as rail lines were built, the area continued to grow. Lumberyards, mills, implement shops, general stores and specialty shops were thriving by 1880. In 1903 Campbellsport and nearby New Cassel were consolidated and the community has continued to grow. Today Campbellsport is home to approximately 1,950 residents.

FOND DU LAC (COUNTY SEAT)

Fond du Lac, French for farthest end of the lake, was originally a trading post. Ample natural resources and access to water attracted pioneers and the area was quickly settled. Streets were platted by Judge Duty in 1835 and by 1850 its population had reached 1,100. As the railroad arrived in 1852 Fond du Lac developed dramatically as passengers and goods were easily transported. The community was selected as the county seat and churches and schools were constructed to meet the growing needs of its residents, including famous resident King Camp Gillette who invented the safety razor. Today Fond du Lac is home to approximately 42,424 residents.

KEWASKUM

Kewaskum is a village in Washington and Fond du Lac Counties. It was incorporated as a village on March 28, 1917. Kewaskum has been referred to as the "Gateway to the Kettle Moraine State Forest" located along the banks of the Milwaukee River. It has had a post office called Kewaskum in operation since 1849. The settlement was named for Kewaskum, an Indian chief. His Menominee name was Kēwāēskam which means "Steps it back". Currently Kewaskum is home to approximately 4,004 residents which resided in the Washington County portion of the village.

RIPON

Settlers arrived to the Ripon area in 1844 and were part of a failed utopian socialist experiment led by Warren Chase. The community was called Ceresco and Captain David Mapes purchased land in 1849 to establish the village of Ripon. The two communities merged in 1853 and were incorporated in 1858, adopting its name after Ripon, England. Today Ripon is home to approximately 7,479 residents.

WAUPUN

First settled by Seymour Wilcox in 1839. The area was first known as Madrid but was changed to Wabun, a Native American word meaning rising sun in the east. A postal spelling error led to its current spelling in 1851 and a state penitentiary was constructed the following year. The area grew dramatically upon the arrival of the railroad, became a center for commerce and industry and has continued to thrive. Today Waupun is home to approximately 10,480 residents.

WINNEBAGO COUNTY HISTORY



Ince home to Winnebago, Fox and Menominee Indian tribes, Winnebago County was settled in the 1830s and organized in 1840. Settlers were attracted to the fertile soil, access to water and ample natural resources. In 1842 Oshkosh was selected as the county seat and development of the railroad allowed for dramatic growth. Early industry was led by commercial fishing, lumbering and agriculture. By 1900 its population had reached 58,225 and the area continued to prosper, growing to 76,622 in 1930. Today Winnebago County is home to approximately 171,730 residents.

MENASHA

Ample timber, access to water and fertile soil attracted settlers to the Menasha area in the 1840s. The community was originally part of Neenah until 1855 when the two towns were split and was named after an Indian word for island. Early industry was led by lumbering and the Menasha Wooden Ware Company was one of the largest producers of wooden products in 1872. The city is located mostly in Winnebago County and a small portion is in the Town of Harrison in Calumet County. Today Menasha is home to approximately 17,353 residents. Of these residents around 15,144 are in Winnebago County, and around 2,209 are in Calumet County.

NEENAH

Neenah, an Indian word for water, was settled in 1835 and named by Judge Doty. The Fox River supplied power and mills were established along the shores. Industry was dominated by lumbering and agriculture. As transportation continued to improve, Neenah continued to develop. It is known as the birthplace of George Edwin Bergstrom, an architect who designed the Pentagon. Today Neenah is home to approximately 25,470 residents.

OSHKOSH (COUNTY SEAT)

Oshkosh, an Indian word for claw and named after Chief Oshkosh, was settled in the 1830s. The community was incorporated in 1853 and selected as the county seat. Industry was dominated by lumbering and railroad expansion allowed for dramatic growth. By 1890 its population had reached 22,840 and the area continued to develop. In 1895 OshKosh B'Gosh was founded and originally produced work clothing for adults and grew to be known for its world famous children's clothing. Today Oshkosh is home to approximately 63,701 residents.

CALUMET COUNTY HISTORY



Calumet County, first known as Chalumet County, was founded in 1836 and its name was derived from the Indian word for Pipe of Peace. Indian Reservations were established throughout the area and as farms were established, communities were formed. Access to Lake Winnebago, fertile soil and ample natural resources attracted many residents and by 1860 its population had reached 7,895. Early industry was led by agriculture and manufacturing and the area continued to grow. Today Calumet County is home to approximately 48,971 residents.

CALUMET COUNTY COMMUNITIES

CHILTON (COUNTY SEAT)

Chilton, originally known as Stantonville, was settled in 1845 by Moses Stanton. Stanton constructed a sawmill which began to draw new residents and in 1853 the community was organized and renamed Chillington. Its name was then shortened to Chilton and the community was selected as the county seat and incorporated in 1877. Schools, churches and businesses were established which included a newspaper office, fire department, hotels, manufacturing shops, breweries, flour mills, general stores and specialty shops. Today Chilton is home to approximately 3,708 residents.

HARRISON

Harrison was first known as Lima when it was established in 1853. In 1858 as the area began to grow, its name was changed to Harrison, and the first town hall was constructed in 1868. Railroad expansion allowed for development and its proximity to Lake Winnebago attracted many new residents. Today Harrison is home to approximately 10,839 residents.

MENASHA

Ample timber, access to water and fertile soil attracted settlers to the Menasha area in the 1840s. The community was originally part of Neenah until 1855 when the two towns were split and was named after an Indian word for island. Early industry was led by lumbering and the Menasha Wooden Ware Company was one of the largest producers of wooden products in 1872. The city is located mostly in Winnebago County and a small portion is in the Town of Harrison in Calumet County. Today Menasha is home to approximately 17,353 residents. Of these residents around 15,144 are in Winnebago County, and around 2,209 are in Calumet County.



OUTAGAMIE COUNTY HISTORY



Utagamie was founded in 1850 and is located in the east-central part of Wisconsin. The County Seat is Appleton, WI. The early settlers of the area were the Menomonee, Outagamie & Winnebago tribes. Today Outagamie County is home to approximately 177,155 residents.

OUTAGAMIE COUNTY COMMUNITIES

APPLETON (COUNTY SEAT)

Located in Outagamie, Calumet & Winnebago Counties. Originally a trading post, Appleton was established as the Lawrence Institute. It was founded in 1847 and the community was named after Samuel Appleton, an early resident who donated \$10,000 to the college. Appleton is the County Seat of Outagamie. Businesses included paper mills, hotels, general stores and the community continued to grow. Appleton is now known as being the residence of the famous magician Harry Houdini in the 1880s. Today Appleton is home to approximately 70,897 residents.

GRAND CHUTE

The Town of Grand Chute was formed on April 3, 1849 which at the time was in Brown County. Outagamie County was founded in February 1851 and had its county government formally organized on April 1, 1851. At that time, the Town of Grand Chute changed from Brown to Outagamie County and was established as the seat of county government affairs. In 1984 residents approved using town funds to attempt to incorporate the town into a village. After town hearings in late 1984, Grand Chute petitioned to the State of Wisconsin. The Wisconsin Department of Development denied the town's request to incorporate on March 25, 1985. Today Grand Chute is home to approximately 20,919 residents.

KAUKAUNA

This area was established in 1885. It was formerly known as "The Lion on the Fox." Kaukauna is one of the oldest towns in Wisconsin. The establishment of a hydroelectric plant, to fuel the cities industry, gave the the town the new nickname "The Electric City." Today Kaukauna is home to approximately 15,462 residents.

NEW LONDON

New London was founded in 1851. Within the city and surrounding the city are 900 acres of parks, trails and recreational areas. New London is considered one of the fastest growing cities in Outagamie County. New London sits on both the Wolf and Embarrass Rivers making it a destination for boaters and fishermen. Today New London is home to approximately 7,295 residents.

Friendly Lawn

Choose a type of grass that thrives in your area. 3" is the optimal height for most grasses, it allows the roots to become strong and healthy. It also helps to absorb more water. Don't bag the lawn clippings, it's a natural fertilizer. Keep your mower blades sharp.





Don't water every day. Give your lawn a good soaking once or twice a week. Your lawn should get about an inch of water each week, whether it be from rain fall or a sprinkler. Water your lawn in the early morning, preferably before 10am. Watering at night time can

create fungus growth.

Don't use pesticides. Correctly identify what the problem is and try a non-chemical method first. If you have to use a chemical based pesticide, try spot treating the problem area. All pesticides are toxic to some degree. Make sure to read all labels.

Fertilizers can harm the environment. Use natural organic or slow-release fertilizers. The best time to fertilize your lawn is in the fall.



• Always wear a properly fitting bike helmet as most serious injuries are to the head. • Be sure your handlebars, seat and wheels fit snugly. • Keep your bike in good shape by checking and oiling your chain, making sure your brakes work properly and maintaining your tire pressure. • Always ride with both hands on the handlebars except when doing turn signals. • When leaving a driveway, curb or alleyway always stop and check for traffic in both directions. • Cross only at intersections. • Use the crosswalk to walk your bike across busy intersections and follow the traffic signals. • Never ride against traffic. and know your vehicle thoroughly. • Check your vehicle before you ride. • Wear protective equipment and clothing. • Don't lend your vehicle to unskilled riders. • Supervise young or inexperienced riders. • Never carry a passenger on vehicles meant for one rider. • Do not operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol. • Drive at speeds that are appropriate to trail conditions. • Stay to the right on trails. • Stay away from thin ice, open water and wetlands • Know the weather forecast. • Make sure headlights and taillights work properly. • Maintain safe distances between other riders. • Reduce your speed when riding at night. • Yield to other motor vehicles and trail users. • Young or beginning riders are encouraged to take a safety training course.

SNOWMOBILE SAFETY

• Do not consume alcohol or take drugs prior to or during your snowmobile trip. Doing so increases your chances of injury or death.. Slow down and don't cut to the inside of the trail corners. It's dangerous and illegal. • If you snowmobile at night, don't override your lights. • Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone. • Drowning is one of the causes of many snowmobile fatalities. Whenever possible, avoid the ice. • Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for operating a snowmobile. • Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and other debris. • Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile. • Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before. • Know the weather forecast, especially the ice and snow conditions. • Be sure your snowmobile is in top-notch mechanical condition throughout the months of use. • Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving. Thoroughly read the manual that accompanies the snowmobile. • Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. That is not the conduct of a sportsman. Report such violations to the nearest law enforcement officer.

Snowmobile Hand Signals

Communication is an essential part of safe riding. Hand signals are a practical way to communicate between other riders and traffic. Be sure to give easy to see and clear hand signals when snowmobiling. Hand signals should never be subtle, but always deliberate.

If you have just rescued / adopted a new fur baby, please it is important to remember the 3-3-3 RULE:

3 Days:

In the first 3 days being in its new home, they will be feeling overwhelmed, scared & unsure of what is going on. They may also be uncomfortable being "themselves", and may not want to eat or drink. They may want to "shut down" or hide under a bed or in a crate, and they will test boundaries.

3 Weeks:

At this point, they may be a lot more comfortable & settling in. Learning a new routine can be overwhelming, so please be patient. By now they may have figured out the new environment & accepted that this may be their FURever home. Their personality traits will start to show, as well as any behavior issue that may be present.

3 Months:

For most fur babies, 3 months is enough time to finally be comfortable and begin to build trust and a true bond. A sense of security may be present & a set routine will help this process.

Please know that this is not the rule with every rescued or adopted pet, as some may need 6 months to a year to adjust & adapt, depending on MANY factors. Age of animal, what type of an environment did they come from?

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BARBECUE DO'S:

- use proper barbecue equipment and tools, such as a grill, tongs, and spatulas.
- preheat your grill before placing any food on it.
- marinate your meat before cooking to enhance the flavor.
- keep a close eye on your food while grilling to prevent overcooking or burning.
- use a meat thermometer to ensure that your meat is cooked to the correct internal temperature.
- Iet your meat rest for a few minutes before slicing or serving to allow the juices to redistribute.
- keep your grill and utensils clean to prevent any foodborne illness.

BARBECUE DON'TS:

- use lighter fluid to start your grill. Instead, use a chimney starter or electric starter.
- overcrowd your grill. Leave enough space between the pieces of meat to ensure even cooking.
- use a fork to flip your meat. Piercing the meat can even cause it to lose its juices and become dry.
- baste your meat with sugary sauces too early in the cooking process, as it can burn and create a bitter taste.
- leave cooked meat out in the sun for too long, as it can spoil quickly.
- assume that meat is fully cooked by its color. Always use a meat thermometer to check the internal temperature.
- leave your grill unattended while it's still hot. Always make sure to properly cool it down before leaving it.
