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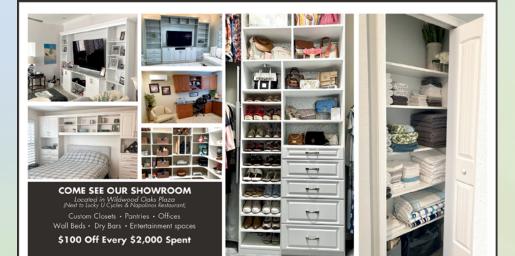

Located in the northern part of Florida, is Marion County. This county holds evidence of ancient indigenous cultures, dating back to the earliest interactions between European explorers and historic indigenous peoples. In 1976, an archaeological investigation unearthed ancient artifacts in Marion County, potentially the oldest in the mainland United States. Created in 1844 from sections of Alachua, Mosquito (Orange), and Hillsborough counties, Marion County came into existence after the United States acquired the Florida territory in the 1820s. General Francis Marion of South Carolina, a notable figure in the American Revolutionary War known as the "Swamp Fox," lent his name to this county. Ocala is the County Seat of Marion. According to the 2020 census, Marion County has a population of 375,908.

Marion County Communities

Belleville

Located in Marion County, Florida, Belleview is renowned for its breathtaking beauty, as its name suggests - derived from the French words "belle" and "vue" which mean "beautiful view". Embracing a "City with Small Town Charm" ethos, Belleview has proudly held this as its motto for generations. Since 1883, a functioning post office has served Belleview. On May 8, 1885, the city was officially incorporated, and as of the 2020 census, Belleview has a population of 5,413 residents.

Dunnellon

Founded in 1887, Dunnellon is a city located in Marion County, Florida. Before the discovery of phosphate in the region in 1889, Dunnellon had already been established for two years. It achieved official city status in 1891. Following this, a mining boom — the initial one in Florida — occurred and persisted until the beginning of the 1910s. The 2020 census recorded a population of 1,928 in Dunnellon.

Ocala - County Seat

Named after the Timucua village of Ocale, Ocala is situated in Marion County, Florida, serving as its county seat. The village's name believed to signify "Big Hammock" in the Timucua language, has been recorded in various forms like Cale and Etocale. Seeking refuge in Florida during the late 18th and early 19th centuries, Creek people, other Native Americans, as well as free and fugitive African Americans, contributed to the region's diversity. Acting as a buffer between the Seminole community and incoming white settlers in the area, Fort King was constructed by the U.S. Army in 1827 near what is now Ocala. Established in 1849, the modern city of Ocala flourished around the fort's location. The introduction of rail service in June 1881 played a significant role in the city's economic growth by enhancing access to markets for agricultural products. Renowned as the "Horse Capital of the World," Ocala hosts over 400 thoroughbred farms and training facilities. Ocala has a population of 63,591, according to the 2020 census.

Silver Spring Shores

A census-designated place (CDP) in Marion County, Florida, is Silver Springs Shores. Locally known as "the shores", this community functions mainly as a bedroom community for Ocala. Situated in southeast Marion County, it holds the title of being the largest community in the area. The population recorded at the 2020 census was 24,846.

The Villages

In the counties of Marion & Sumter, The Villages is a census-designated place (CDP). In the 1960s, a businessman named Harold Schwartz from Michigan started selling land tracts in The Villages area via mail order. After a 1968 federal law that outlawed mail-order real estate sales was put into effect, he and his business partner, Al Tarrson, were obliged to shut down this portion of the company. The CDP had 79,077 residents as of the 2020 census.



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Health Benefits of Physical Activity Major Research Findings

from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention

- Regular moderate-to-vigorous physical activity reduces the risk of many adverse health outcomes.
- Some physical activity is better than none.
- For most health outcomes, additional benefits occur as the amount of physical activity increases through higher intensity, greater frequency, and/or longer duration.
- Substantial health benefits for adults occur with 150 to 300 minutes a week of moderate-intensity physical activity. Additional benefits occur with more physical activity.
- Both aerobic and muscle-strengthening physical activity are beneficial.
- Health benefits occur for children and adolescents, young and middle-aged adults, older adults, and those in every studied racial and ethnic group.
- The health benefits of physical activity occur for people with chronic conditions or disabilities.
- The benefits of physical activity generally outweigh the risk of adverse outcomes or injury.

Guidelines for Adults

- For substantial health benefits, you should do at least 2.5hrs a week of moderate-intensity, or 1.25hrs a week of vigorous-intensity aerobic activity, or a combination of the two activities. Aerobic activity should be performed in episodes of at least 10 minutes, and should be done throughout the week.
- For even better health benefits, adults should increase their aerobic physical activity to 5hrs a week
 of moderate-intensity, or 2.5hrs a week of vigorous-intensity aerobic physical activity, or a
 combination of the two activities.

Guidelines for Children and Adolescents

- Children and adolescents should do an hour or more of physical activity daily.
- Aerobic: Most of the hour or more a day should be either moderate- or vigorous-intensity aerobic physical activity.
- Muscle-strengthening: As part of their hour or more of daily physical activity, children and adolescents should include muscle-strengthening physical activity on at least 3 days of the week.
- Bone-strengthening: As part of their hour or more of daily physical activity, children and adolescents should include bone-strengthening physical activity on at least 3 days of the week.
- It is important to encourage young people to participate in physical activities that are appropriate for their age, that are enjoyable, and that offer variety.

Start slowly. Cardiac events, such as a heart attack, are rare during physical activity. But the risk does go up when you suddenly become much more active than usual. For example, you can put yourself at risk if you don't usually *get much physical activity* and then all of a sudden do vigorous-intensity aerobic activity, like shoveling snow. That's why it's important to start slowly and gradually increase your level of activity.

Intensity Examples

- Walking briskly (3 mph or faster, but not race-walking)
- Water aerobics
- Bicycling slower than 10mph
- Tennis (doubles)
- Ballroom dancing

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How does a septic system work?

Most septic systems have two components- a tank and a drainfield. Everything you flush down the drains (toilets, showers, laundry...) are connected by pipes (your plumbing.) Those pipes join together to form one line that enters into your septic tank. This tank is a holding cell to process your sewage and turn everything into the most liquid state possible. Your tank always stays full, and when the liquid starts to rise in tank during use, the most liquid part of your waste then goes through the outlet pipe of the tank into the drainfield. The drainfield is like a massive sponge in your yard. That liquid is then cleaned using sunlight, oxygen and bacteria in the soil, where it then slowly trickles back down into the aquifer.

What do I need to do to maintain a good healthy septic system?

About every 3 years you should call to have your system pumped out and serviced. This should include a filter cleaning if you have a filter in your tank. Why is this? Your tank does a good job of breaking down sewage if it has a healthy bacteria life but over time, there is a build-up of materials that no longer break down and need to be pumped out to restart the process. Your tank functions like your gut- you want to have good healthy bacteria in there at all times. You may need to add good bacteria into your tank periodically, especially if you use cleaning (bacteria killing) chemicals to clean your home. We sell an industrial grade product that only needs to be used occasionally or you can

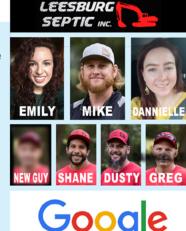

Bag & Length Limits

ONE DAY BAG LIMITS FOR FRESHWATER GAME FISH:

5 Black Bass (including largemouth, suwannee, spotted, choctaw & shoal bass, individually or in total), only one of which may be 16 inches or longer in total length. There is no minimum length limit for largemouth bass.

* No person shall kill or possess any Suwannee, shoal, spotted, or Choctaw bass that is less than 12 inches in total length.

* Chipola River and its tributaries: No person shall kill or possess shoal bass on the Chipola River or its tributaries. Any shoal bass that are caught must be released immediately.

20 Striped Bass, white bass, & sunshine bass (individually or in total), of which only 6 may be 24 inches or longer in total length. * In the Suwannee River, areas north & west of the Suwannee River, & in any tributary, creek or stream of the Suwannee River: the bag limit for striped bass is 3, each of which must be at least 18 inches in total length (20 fish combined bag limit).

* In the lower Ochlockonee River (downstream of the Jackson Bluff dam to Ochlockonee Bay): the bag limit for striped bass is 3, only one of which may be 24 inches or longer in total length. There is no minimum length limit (20 fish combined bag limit). **50** Panfish including bluegill, redear sunfish (shellcracker), flier, longear sunfish, mud sunfish, shadow bass, spotted sunfish (stumpknocker), warmouth & redbreast sunfish, individually or in total.

25 Crappie (speckled perch).

2 Butterfly Peacock Bass, only one of which may be 17 inches or longer in total length.

10 Alabama Shad, american shad, hickory shad, & blueback herring (individually or in total), which may only be taken with hook & line gear.

25 American Eels, must be nine inches or greater in total length. The recreational bag limit for american eels is 25 per angler per day. Wholesale/retail purchase exemption. Recreational anglers purchasing american eel as bait may possess more than the legal bag limit provided that the eels were purchased from a licensed dealer.

BARBECUE DO'S:

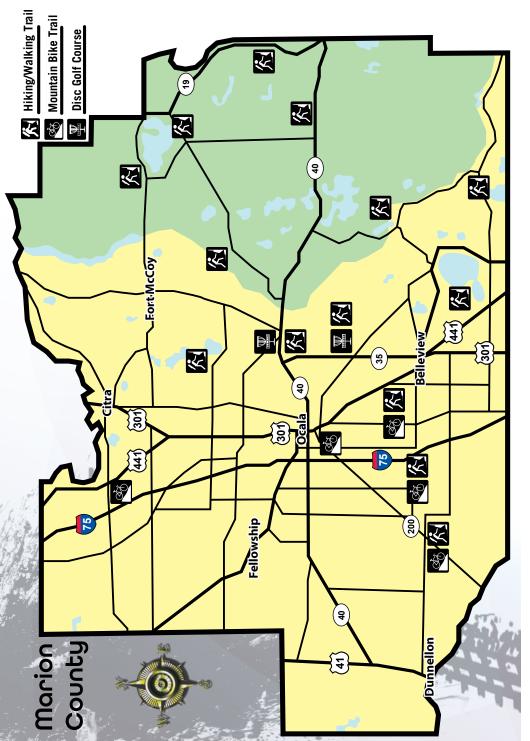

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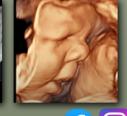
