In 1853 the city of Marinette had a population of 478, with over half of the population being Native American. At this time there were only three permanent dwellings. They were the homes of Queen Marinette, John B. Jacobs, and Dr. Hall. In 1879, Marinette County was formed from the eastern and northwestern portions of Oconto County. At this time the main industry for Marinette County was lumbering. The first sawmill for the area was built in 1831 by William Farnsworth and Charles Brush. As the forests began to dwindle the industry shifted gears towards agriculture. Currently Marinette County's two main industries are agriculture and tourism. The county has around 42,000 residents living there today.

MARINETTE (COUNTY SEAT)

Marinette is a city and the county seat of Marinette County, Wisconsin, United States. It is located on the south bank of the Menominee River, at its mouth at Green Bay, part of Lake Michigan; to the north is Stephenson Island (Wisconsin), part of the city preserved as park. During the lumbering boom of the late 19th century, Marinette became the tenth-largest city in Wisconsin in 1900, with its peak population of 16,195.

NIAGRA

Niagara is a city in Marinette County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 1,624 at the 2010 census. The city lies to the north of and adjacent to the Town of Niagara. It is part of the Marinette, WI–MI Micropolitan Statistical Area. The city of Niagara was founded in 1900 on the banks of the Menominee River. Niagara is an Iroquois word that means “thundering waters”, which is also used in the famous Niagara Falls, between New York and the Canadian province of Ontario.

PESHTIGO

Peshtigo is a city in Marinette County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 3,502 at the 2010 census. The city is located within the Town of Peshtigo. It is part of the Marinette, WI–MI Micropolitan Statistical Area. Peshtigo is most famous as the site of the Peshtigo Fire of 1871, in which more than 1,200 people perished. Peshtigo took its name from the nearby Peshtigo River. The etymology of Peshtigo is uncertain. Explanations include an Ojibwe word meaning ‘river of the wild goose’, a Menominee word for ‘snapping turtle’, a word meaning ‘passing through a marsh’, or a reference to a local Menominee band known as Pesh-tiko.

DISC GOLF

Disc golf or frisbee golf is played a lot like traditional ball golf but instead of hitting a ball with a club into a hole the player throws a frisbee into a basket.

Disc golf can be played by just about anyone at any age. It's also an inexpensive sport to get into. Specialized frisbees for disc golf cost around \$10-\$15 and a lot of courses are free. Playing disc golf is a great way to get out for some exercise, enjoy nature and have some fun.



Oconto County is a county in the U.S. state of Wisconsin. As of the 2010 census, the population was 37,660. Its county seat is Oconto. The county was established in 1851. Oconto County is part of the Green Bay, WI Metropolitan Statistical Area as well as the Green Bay-Shawano, WI Combined Statistical Area. First visited by French explorers in the 17th century, Oconto County is among the oldest settlements in Wisconsin. Father Claude-Jean Allouez of the Roman Catholic Jesuit order said the first Mass in Oconto. Among the first settlers was Joseph Tourtilott, who explored much of the Oconto River watershed. Oconto County was created in 1851 and organized in 1854.

ABRAMS

Abrams is a town in Oconto County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 1,757 at the 2000 Census. The census-designated place of Abrams is located in the town. Abrams was named after W. J. Abrams, Wisconsin legislator and Mayor of Green Bay, Wisconsin.

GILLETT

Gillett is a city in Oconto County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 1,386 at the 2010 census. It is part of the Green Bay Metropolitan Statistical Area. The city is located within the Town of Gillett. A post office called Gillett has been in operation since 1871. The city was named for R. Gillett, a pioneer settler.

LITTLE SUAMICO

Little Suamico is a town in Oconto County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 4,799 at the 2010 Census. The town has a total area of 37.4 square miles and 0.1 square miles of that is water. The earliest records that can be found are from 1859 and Ernst Kuntze was Chairman, Clerk, and Treasurer.

OCONTO (COUNTY SEAT)

Oconto is a city in Oconto County, Wisconsin, United States. The population was 4,513 at the 2010 census. It is part of the Green Bay Metropolitan Statistical Area. The city is located partially within the town of Oconto. Oconto is home to Copper Culture State Park, which has remains dated to around 5000-6000 B.C. It is a burial ground of the Copper Culture Indians. This burial ground is considered to be the oldest cemetery in Wisconsin and one of the oldest in the nation.

PULASKI

Pulaski is a village in Brown, Oconto, and Shawano counties in the U.S. state of Wisconsin. The population was 3,539 at the 2010 census. Of this, 3,321 were in Brown County, 218 in Shawano County, and none in Oconto County. The Brown and Oconto County portions of Pulaski are part of the Green Bay Metropolitan Statistical Area. The village was named for the Polish Revolutionary War general Kazimierz Pułaski, who was responsible for creating America's first cavalry.





Once home to Native Americans, Door County was part of Brown County in 1848 and first settled by Increase and Mary Clafin. In 1851 Door County was set off from Brown County and early industry was dominated by logging and fishing. Sturgeon Bay was selected as the county seat and the first court hearings were held in a hotel until a more permanent structure was built in 1878. Ample natural resources and the ideal location attracted new residents and as transportation improved, tourism became popular. By 1900 the population of Door County had reached 17,583 and the area continued to grow. It is now an area rich in history and culture and today Door County is home to approximately 27,815 residents.

BRUSSELS
 Brussels was settled by Belgian immigrants and the community was named after the capital of Belgium. The first election was held in 1858 and Brussels was organized the following year. Settlers were attracted to the fertile soil and many farmed the land. A fire swept through the area in 1871 and many buildings were destroyed. Residents rebuilt resiliently and the area continued to develop. Belgian Days, now held annually in July, pays homage to the area's rich heritage.

EGG HARBOR
 Egg Harbor was founded in 1861 and its first settlers were Jacob and Levi Thorp. The Thorp brothers established a lumber mill and later expanded to building a pier, orchards and the historic Cupola House. As the area continued to develop churches and schools were established and tourism became popular. By 1900 businesses included saloons, resorts, dance halls, grocery stores, feed mills and a variety of specialty shops.

EPHRAIM

Ephraim was established by Reverend Andreas Iverson in 1853 as a Moravian community. Its name is biblical for fruitful and the fertile soil of the area attracted many residents. Churches, schools and warehouses were constructed and the area continued to thrive. The community owned the first motorized fire truck in Door County, purchased in 1934 and is widely recognized as being the only community in Wisconsin that prohibits the manufacturing and sale of liquor.

FORESTVILLE

Forestville was established in 1857 as settlers traveled along the Ahnapee River. The first town meeting was held in 1858 in the home of Marcus McCormick and the community was named Forestville after the plentiful timber. Early businesses included sawmills, general stores, tailors, blacksmiths and barges. The first post office was established in 1858 and the first school was founded the following year. A fire nearly destroyed the community in 1871 but residents quickly rebuilt. As transportation continued to improve Forestville continued to develop.

JACKSONPORT

Jacksonport was officially established on March 9, 1869 as the fourteenth and last township in Door County. Around 1850, the first white man, Neil Blair, settled in Jacksonport. He was a commercial fisherman and farmer. In 1861 Perry Hibbard moved to Jacksonport and built a dock. He was in the lumbering, store and shipping business. During this time commercial fishing and lumbering were important industries. Presently Jacksonport is built more around agriculture and being a tourist destination. In 1885 there were 862 people living in Jacksonport, today there are around 738 people living in Jacksonport.

STURGEON BAY (COUNTY SEAT)

First known as Otumba, Sturgeon Bay began as a trading post and the area was first settled in the 1830s. The community was renamed Sturgeon Bay in 1860 due to the resemblance of the sturgeon. As a canal was constructed, Sturgeon Bay continued to grow and businesses included general stores, livery stables, warehouses, saloons and hotels. In 1872 the Sturgeon Bay Ship Canal was constructed to allow access from Green Bay to Lake Michigan and continued transportation improvements allowed for growth. The first lighthouse was built in 1882 with Rufus M. Wright serving as its keeper. Sturgeon Bay was selected as the county seat for Door County and the area continued to thrive.

WASHINGTON ISLAND

Once part of Brown County, Washington Island was settled by Scandinavian and Icelandic immigrants and is one of the oldest settlements in Wisconsin. The area surrounding the island was often known as Deaths Door due to the dangerous currents and many ships were lost off the coast. As pioneers continued to arrive the town of Washington was founded in 1850 and churches, schools and businesses were established. Industry included fishing, lumbering, farming and tourism. By 1910 its population had reached 1,200 during summer months and the area continued to thrive.



Menominee County is a county located in the Upper Peninsula in the U.S. state of Michigan. As of the 2010 census, the population was 24,029. The county seat is Menominee. The county's name comes from an American Indian word meaning "wild rice eater" used to describe a tribe. The county was originally created under the name of Bleeker in 1861. When county government was organized in 1863, the name was changed to Menominee.

HARRIS

Harris Township is a civil township of Menominee County in the U.S. state of Michigan. The population was 1,895 at the 2000 census. The township has a total area of 143.2 square miles and 0.1 square miles of that is water. Most of the Hannahville Indian Community Indian reservation is located within Harris Township. The first post office was established on July 8, 1880 named "DeLoughary" after George W. DeLoughary, a local farmer.

MENOMINEE (COUNTY SEAT)

Menominee is a city in the Upper Peninsula of the U.S. state of Michigan. The population was 8,599 at the 2010 census. Menominee is the fourth-largest city in the Upper Peninsula, behind Marquette, Sault Ste. Marie, and Escanaba. The city was named after a Native American tribe known as the Menominee, meaning wild rice. The city started as a lumber town in the 19th century and produced more lumber than any other city in the United States. In 1910 the Dudly Tool Company started to produce the gas powered cyclecar called the Dudly Bug. Today the economy of Menominee is based on tourism, manufacturing paper products, wicker lawn furniture and auto supplies.

MENOMINEE (TOWNSHIP)

Menominee Township is a civil township of Menominee County in the U.S. state of Michigan. The population was 3,939 at the 2000 census. The City of Menominee is located at the southern end of the township, but is administratively autonomous. The Township dates back to the formation of the county. In 1848 John Mullett surveyed the area and found a sawmill and blacksmith already established. In 1863 when Menominee County was first organized it had two townships, Menominee and Cedarville.

SPALDING (TOWNSHIP)

Spalding Township is a civil township of Menominee County in the U.S. state of Michigan. The population was 1,761 at the 2000 census. It was settled in 1871 and is named after Jesse Spalding (1833–1904), president of the Spalding Lumber Co. The North Western railroad was started in 1871 and completed in 1873. After the railroad was finished a large lumber mill was set up and employed up to 400 people. The town took a hit in 1889 when a fire swept through the area destroying most all the buildings.





Eat Breakfast




10 Tips for Green Thumb GARDENING

Don't like all the dirt in your fingernails while you work in the garden? Before you go out, run your fingernails across a bar of soap and you'll effectively seal the undersides of your nails so dirt cannot accumulate. Then, after you are all done gardening, use a toothpick or nailbrush to remove the soap and your nails will be sparkling clean.

Make a convenient measuring tool out of a long handled garden tool by laying it on the ground next to a tape measure. Use a permanent marker to copy the inches and feet. Next time you are spacing plants you already have a dual-purpose measuring tool in your hand!

Write the names of your plants (With a permanent marker) on the flat parts of stones of any size and lay them in front of your plants for natural looking markers.



The next time you boil or steam vegetables, use the leftover water to water potted patio plants, and you'll be surprised at how the plants grow with "vege-soup."

You can use leftover tea and coffee grounds to help acidify the soil of acid-loving plants like azaleas, rhododendrons, camellias, gardenias and blueberries. A light sprinkle of about 1/4 of an inch applied once a month will help keep the pH of the soil on the acidic side.



You can use chamomile tea to control damping-off fungus, which often attacks young seedlings quite suddenly. Just add some tea to the soil around the soil of seedlings once a week for healthy plant.

Here is a really quick way to dry out your herbs: Just lay a sheet of newspaper on the seat of your car, arrange the herbs in a single layer, then roll up the windows and shut the car doors. Your herbs will be dry in no time!



Use your blender to grind up egg shells. Just like a mother bird chews up worms for the baby birds making the food easier to digest, grinding eggshells makes it easy for your garden to absorb the calcium egg shells retain.

Animals (cats especially) seem to think all of the hard work you've put into your garden looks like a huge litter box. To keep them from pooping on your basil and other plants, strategically place a few plastic forks around your plants to deter them from destroying your fresh herbs, fruits, and vegetables.



PARENTS:

- Teach your kids that an emergency is when you need help from a doctor, a police officer or a firefighter.
- Designate a safe place by your house that a child can go to if they need help right away.
- Have your kids memorize your address and phone numbers. They should also know your full name and where you work.

KIDS:

FIRE SAFETY

- If you or someone else is on fire - remember to STOP, DROP and ROLL. Wrap a blanket on the person to help put out the fire.
- If there is a fire, leave the house as fast as you can! Crawl on the floor to avoid smoke and if the door is hot, don't open it - find another way out.
- Learn all the fire exits in your house. Assign a safe place outside for everyone to meet in case of a fire emergency.

HOME ALONE

- Never tell anyone that you are home alone.
- If someone calls and asks for your mom and dad, tell them "They cannot come to the phone right now, can you please call back later?"
- Do not answer the door, unless it is someone that you know your parents have okay'd them to come over.



FIRST AID FOR INSECT BITES/ANAPHYLAXIS & POISON SAFETY

INSECT BITES/ANAPHYLAXIS

Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction from insect bites (latex, food and drug allergies can also cause Anaphylaxis). Typical symptoms include hives, the swelling of lips or eyes, swollen throat, drop in blood pressure, light headedness, confusion, nausea or diarrhea. If someone is having an allergic reaction from an insect bite seek medical attention immediately.

POISON PREVENTION

Teach your children about poison and how it can look like a food or drink. They should always ask an adult before eating or drinking anything. Have them learn the poison control phone number: 1-800-222-1222 and keep it programmed or posted near all your phones. Here are some prevention tips.

Lock up your poisons and medications. Keep them out of the reach of children, lock them up if possible. Make sure your children understand that medicine is not candy.

Follow directions carefully. Read your labels. Be sure to use and store all poisons and medications properly according to recommendations.

Keep your pets safe from household chemicals, too. Don't allow pets near areas that have just been cleaned with chemicals, such as freshly mopped floors or bleached bathtubs and sinks. Clean up any antifreeze/coolant spills. Pets like the flavor but they can die if they ingest it. Store poisonous foods or plants in areas that your pets cannot access. Call your local emergency veterinary hospital if you believe your pet has been poisoned.



FIRST AID FOR BURNS & CHOKING

BURNS

For minor 1st and 2nd degree burns smaller than 3" in diameter: Cool the Burn. Run cool water over the burned area for 5 minutes, or until the pain diminishes. Never put ice on a burn!

Bandage the burn with sterile gauze:

It is important to use loosely wrapped gauze. This will avoid pressure and the bandage protects blisters. NEVER put lotions, vaseline, ointments or butter on burn. Do not break any blisters, which can cause infection.

Take Aspirin, Ibuprofen, Naproxen or Acetaminophen to relieve pain:

Minor burns usually heal with these basic treatments. Be aware for signs of infection which may include: increased pain, redness, fever, swelling or oozing. If symptoms develop, seek medical help. Avoid tanning the burned area for at least a year. Protect the area with sunscreen outdoors. Avoid giving aspirin to children.

For 3rd degree burns/all major burns - DIAL 911

DO NOT run cold water over large severe burns - this can cause shock.

DO NOT remove burnt clothing.

Check for signs of breathing/coughing/movement.

If there are no signs of breathing begin CPR.

Elevate burned areas above heart level, if possible.

Cover the burn(s) with cool, sterile, moist bandages, towels or cloth.

CHOKING

Most people clutch at their throats when choking, an obvious symbol for help. However, if a person isn't giving that signal, be alert for these indications. Inability to talk, difficulty breathing or noisy breathing, inability to cough forcefully, skin/lips/nails turning blue, loss of consciousness.

The Red Cross recommends a "five-and-five" method for first aid: First give five blows between the person's shoulders with the heel of your hand. Second, perform the Heimlich maneuver (abdominal thrusts) five times. Alternate between five back blows and five abdominal thrusts until the blockage is dislodged.
