Defore settlement, Stearns County was home to the Dakota, Sioux, Chippewa and Ojibwa tribes. In the 1800s, explorers began arriving and many fur trading posts were established. In the 1850s, many immigrants settled in the Stearns area for its fertile soil and were involved in agriculture. Officially established in 1855, Stearns County was originally named Stevens County after Gov. Isaac I. Stevens. The name was later changed to Stearns to honor Territorial Council member Charles T. Stearns, an active participant in the founding of the county. St. Cloud was designated the county seat in the 1860s, and many efforts were made by the county government to build roads, bridges and schools and assist residents. In 1913, an attempt was made to move the county seat to Albany, but due to a lack of signatures on the petition, St. Cloud would remain the home of Stearns County affairs. Today Stearns County is home to approximately 160,405 residents.

Stearns County Communities

ALBANY

Albany was first settled in 1863 and the area was originally known as Schwinghammer Settlement. As the railroad arrived in 1871, the community was renamed Albany after Albany, New York, from where many settlers originated. Albany was incorporated in 1890 and the area has continued to thrive. Today Albany is home to approximately 2,561 residents.

BELGRADE

Belgrade was platted in 1887 by the Pacific Land Company and incorporated as a village on March 19, 1888. The post office began as Crow Lake in 1871, changing to Belgrade in 1886. The railroad was also built through the area in 1886. The first house in Belgrade was built by Norwegian immigrant, Otto Christianson in 1874. The city has a property listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the 1904 Christopher Borgerding House. Today Belgrade is home to approximately 740 residents.

COLD SPRING

The first settlers, mostly of German descent, traveled along the Red River Oxen Trail, where they rested and stopped near present day Cold Spring. Settlers were attracted to the area because it resembled the German countryside. Cold Spring was established in 1856 and today is home to approximately 4,025 residents.

COLLEGEVILLE

Collegeville Township is named such because it is where Saint John's University is located. Saint John's is a private liberal arts, men's college that has a relationship with the College of Saint Benedict, a women's college in the neighboring town of St. Joseph, allowing students to take courses on both campuses. Saint John's was founded in 1857 by the monks of Saint John's Abbey. Today Collegeville is home to approximately 3,344 residents.

EDEN VALLEY

Located in Meeker and Stearns Counties, Eden Valley was settled in 1856. The community was first known as Pappelbush and was renamed by officers of the railroad. Eden Valley was organized in 1867 and streets were platted in 1886. By 1894 the community was incorporated and housed a post office, general store and assortment of specialty shops. Today Eden Valley is home to approximately 1,027 residents.

MELROSE

The first settlers arrived in the 1850s as two brothers, Warren and Napoleon Adley, established a homestead on the Sauk River. By 1867, a hotel, stage coach station, post office and school had been built and the city was incorporated in 1887. It was named after Melrose, Scotland, the area the Adley brothers originated from. Today Melrose is home to approximately 3,598 residents.

PAYNESVILLE

Paynesville was named after its first settler, Edwin E. Payne, who arrived to the area in 1857 and served as its first postmaster. Payne platted streets and businesses were established and the area began to prosper. Paynesville was incorporated in 1887 and railroad development sparked growth. Today Paynesville is home to approximately 2,388 residents.

RICHMOND

The city of Richmond was founded in 1890, in the middle of what is known as The Horseshoe Chain of Lakes. There are 40 lakes within a 10 mile radius of Richmond, which provides residents and visitors with easy access to a wide variety of outdoor activities. Today Richmond is home to approximately 1,422 residents.

ST. CLOUD (COUNTY SEAT)

Once a way station on the Red River Trails, St. Cloud developed from three separate settlements and unified to offset hardship. The city was incorporated in 1856 and is named after the Parisian suburb, Saint Cloud, by John Wilson. Since the 1880s, granite quarries have operated in St. Cloud, deeming the area "Granite City." Today St. Cloud is home to approximately 68,881 residents.

ST. JOSEPH

As many travelers and explorers arrived to the area, St. Joseph began as a German settlement in 1854. It is home to the world's only operating Schwalbach Mechanical Clock which was built in 1906 by Mathias Schwalbach. Schwalbach was a master clock tower builder from the Rhine country and his clock can be found in the Church of St. Joseph. Today St. Joseph is home to approximately 7,029 residents.

ST. MARTIN

St. Martin Township was settled in 1857 and organized in 1863. The city was founded in 1866 and incorporated as a village in 1891. It was named after Saint Martin of Tours a Christian saint. The community had a post office, established as Leedston in 1868 and its name was changed in 1891. The post office was shut down in 1905 and reopened in 1928. Today St. Martin is home to approximately 308 residents.

SARTELL

Sartell was once known as the "Third Rapids," named by a French fur trader. In 1854 Joseph B. Sartell arrived to the area and opened a flour mill on the Watab River. In the 1880s, along with his brothers, Joseph B. Sartell opened the Sartell Lumber Company. In 1907, Sartell was incorporated and named after its founder. Today Sartell is home to approximately 19,351 residents.

SAUK CENTRE

In 1857, Alexander Moore and other settlers staked out the boundaries of what would become Sauk Centre. A dam was built that same year and the city grew around the logging and milling industry on the river. Sauk Centre was incorporated as a village in 1876. The city is home to Sinclair Lewis, a world-famous novelist and America's first winner of the Nobel Prize for literature. Today Sauk Centre is home to approximately 4,555 residents.

WAITE PARK

Development in Waite Park began in the 1840s as travelers crossed the Sauk River. Once known as Waite's Crossing, Waite Park is named after Henry Chester Waite of St. Cloud. Waite was a landowner, attorney, statesman and entrepreneur who became Minnesota's first attorney. In 1983 Waite Park was incorporated as a village. Today Waite Park is home to approximately 8,341 residents.








So, You have decided to get a pet... NOW WHAT??

If you have just rescued / adopted a new fur baby, please it is important to remember the 3-3-3 RULE:

3 Days:

In the first 3 days being in its new home, they will be feeling overwhelmed, scared & unsure of what is going on. They may also be uncomfortable being "themselves", and may not want to eat or drink. They may want to "shut down" or hide under a bed or in a crate, and they will test boundaries.

3 Weeks:

At this point, they may be a lot more comfortable & settling in. Learning a new routine can be overwhelming, so please be patient. By now they may have figured out the new environment & accepted that this may be their FURever home. Their personality traits will start to show, as well as any behavior issue that may be present.

3 Months:

For most fur babies, 3 months is enough time to finally be comfortable and begin to build trust and a true bond. A sense of security may be present & a set routine will help this process.

Please know that this is not the rule with every rescued or adopted pet, as some may need 6 months to a year to adjust & adapt, depending on MANY factors. Age of animal, what type of an environment did they come from?

Autumn Foliage

In the spring and summer tree leaves are green, producing nutrients for the tree. The green color comes from cells in the leaves containing chlorophyll. Chlorophyll absorbs sunlight for energy to transform carbon dioxide and water into carbohydrates.

In the fall, shortening days and cooling temperatures makes the leaves stop producing nutrients. The chlorophyll starts to break down and the green color disappears. The different colors of each tree and tree type are due to the mixing of varying amounts of the chlorophyll residue and other pigments in the leaf during the fall season.
