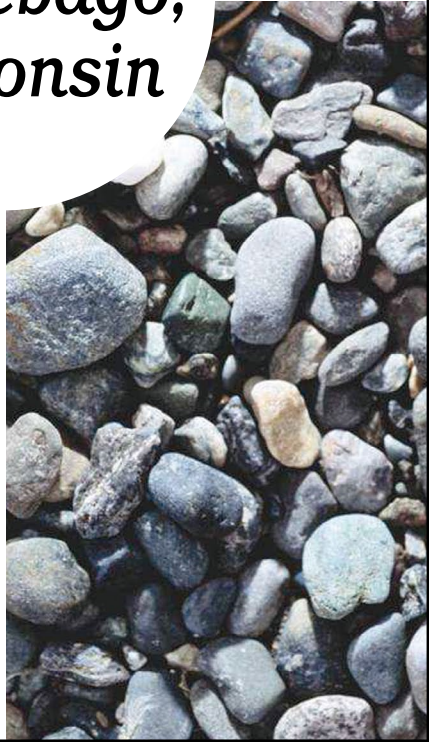

## Fond du Lac County History (Fond du Lac, County Seat)

Once home to Winnebago Indian tribes, Fond du Lac County was settled in the 1830s and established in 1836. By 1850 the area was organized and communities were founded as pioneers were attracted to the ample timber, fertile soil and water supply. The City of Fond du Lac was selected as the county seat and the area continued to thrive. Railroad development allowed for dramatic growth and early industry was led by agriculture and lumbering. By 1900 its population had reached 47,589 and the area continued to prosper. Today Fond du Lac County is home to approximately 100,070 residents.

# Fond du Lac County Communities

## CAMPBELLSPORT

Once known as Crouchville, Campbellsport was settled in 1846. The community was renamed after Stuart Campbell, a local landowner in 1873. Streets were platted by Jacob Haessly and as rail lines were built, the area continued to grow. Lumberyards, mills, implement shops, general stores and specialty shops were thriving by 1880. In 1903 Campbellsport and nearby New Cassel were consolidated and the community has continued to grow. Today Campbellsport is home to approximately 1,950 residents.

## FOND DU LAC (COUNTY SEAT)

Fond du Lac, French for farthest end of the lake, was originally a trading post. Ample natural resources and access to water attracted pioneers and the area was quickly settled. Streets were platted by Judge Duty in 1835 and by 1850 its population had reached 1,100. As the railroad arrived in 1852 Fond du Lac developed dramatically as passengers and goods were easily transported. The community was selected as the county seat and churches and schools were constructed to meet the growing needs of its residents, including famous resident King Camp Gillette who invented the safety razor. Today Fond du Lac is home to approximately 42,424 residents.

# Fond du Lac County Communities

## KEWASKUM

Located in Washington and Fond du Lac Counties, Kewaskum was first settled in 1852. Railroad development allowed for growth and by 1881 the area housed six hotels, four grain elevators, three general stores, schools, churches, a manufacturing shop and a variety of specialty shops. In 1917 Kewaskum was incorporated and the area continued to grow. Today Kewaskum is home to approximately 3,946 residents.

## MOUNT CALVARY

Mount Calvary was settled in the 1840s as pioneers were attracted to the fertile farmland and ample natural resources. By 1900 the area housed a cheese factory, mills, general stores, specialty shops and the area was recognized as the Holyland due to the many churches found throughout the countryside. Today Mount Calvary is home to approximately 909 residents.

## OAKFIELD

Originally known as Lime, Oakfield was first settled by Russell Wilkinson in 1840. The community was renamed Oakfield in 1846 after the plentiful oak trees found throughout the area. By 1852 businesses included mills, schools, churches, a general store and a post office with Isaac Orvis serving as its first postmaster. Railroad development allowed for growth and Oakfield continued to thrive. Today Oakfield is home to approximately 1,014 residents.

## RIPON

Settlers arrived to the Ripon area in 1844 and were part of a failed utopian socialist experiment led by Warren Chase. The community was called Ceresco and Captain David Mapes purchased land in 1849 to establish the village of Ripon. The two communities merged in 1853 and were incorporated in 1858, adopting its name after Ripon, England. Today Ripon is home to approximately 7,479 residents.

## WAUPUN

First settled by Seymour Wilcox in 1839. The area was first known as Madrid but was changed to Wabun, a Native American word meaning rising sun in the east. A postal spelling error led to its current spelling in 1851 and a state penitentiary was constructed the following year. The area grew dramatically upon the arrival of the railroad, became a center for commerce and industry and has continued to thrive. Today Waupun is home to approximately 10,480 residents.



## Winnebago County History *(Oshkosh, County Seat)*

Once home to Winnebago, Fox and Menominee Indian tribes, Winnebago County was settled in the 1830s and organized in 1840. Settlers were attracted to the fertile soil, access to water and ample natural resources. In 1842 Oshkosh was selected as the county seat and development of the railroad allowed for dramatic growth. Early industry was led by commercial fishing, lumbering and agriculture. By 1900 its population had reached 58,225 and the area continued to prosper, growing to 76,622 in 1930. Today Winnebago County is home to approximately 163,370 residents.

# Winnebago County Communities

## **ALGOMA**

First known as Wolf River, Algoma was established in 1848. Settlers were attracted to the shores of Lake Winnebago and early industry was dominated by lumbering and fishing. By 1879 its population had reached 799 and the community housed a newspaper office, general stores and a variety of specialty shops. As rail lines were constructed Algoma continued to thrive. Today Algoma is home to approximately 5,722 residents.

## **MENASHA**

Ample timber, access to water and fertile soil attracted settlers to the Menasha area in the 1840s. The community was originally part of Neenah until 1855 when the two towns were split and was named after an Indian word for island. Early industry was led by lumbering and the Menasha Wooden Ware Company was one of the largest producers of wooden products in 1872. Today Menasha is home to approximately 16,664 residents.

## **NEENAH**

Neenah, an Indian word for water, was settled in 1835 and named by Judge Doty. The Fox River supplied power and mills were established along the shores. Industry was dominated by lumbering and agriculture. As transportation continued to improve, Neenah continued to develop. It is known as the birthplace of George Edwin Bergstrom, an architect who designed the Pentagon. Today Neenah is home to approximately 25,470 residents.

## **OMRO**

Attracted to the fertile soil, Omro was settled in 1847 and first known as Bloomingdale. By 1853 its name was changed to Omro in honor of Charles Omro, an early fur trader. Businesses included mills, fairgrounds, factories, hotels, churches and schools, and by 1890 Omro was home to over 2,200 residents. As manufacturing centers were moved to Oshkosh, development began to slow. Today Omro is home to approximately 3,437 residents.

## **OSHKOSH (COUNTY SEAT)**

Oshkosh, an Indian word for claw and named after Chief Oshkosh, was settled in the 1830s. The community was incorporated in 1853 and selected as the county seat. Industry was dominated by lumbering and railroad expansion allowed for dramatic growth. By 1890 its population had reached 22,840 and the area continued to develop. In 1895 OshKosh B'Gosh was founded and originally produced work clothing for adults and grew to be known for its world famous children's clothing. Today Oshkosh is home to approximately 63,701 residents.

# Winnebago County Communities

## WINNECONNE

Settled in the 1840s, Winneconne grew quickly and was named in 1851 after an Indian word for the place of the skull. The first bridge was built in 1853 by J.D. Rush and the area continued to develop. Early industry was led by fishing and milling and the area quickly was known as a paradise for hunting and recreational activities, and Winneconne has continued to grow. Today Winneconne is home to approximately 2,463 residents.

## Calumet County History *(Chilton, County Seat)*

Calumet County, first known as Chalumet County, was founded in 1836 and its name was derived from the Indian word for Pipe of Peace. Indian Reservations were established throughout the area and as farms were established, communities were formed. Access to Lake Winnebago, fertile soil and ample natural resources attracted many residents and by 1860 its population had reached 7,895. Early industry was led by agriculture and manufacturing and the area continued to grow. Today Calumet County is home to approximately 48,971 residents.

# Calumet County Communities

## BRILLION

One of the last communities settled in Calumet County during the 1850s, Brillion was first known as Woodville. The area began to develop as sawmills were constructed and by 1900 the community boasted a planing mill, shingle mill, stave factory, general stores and a variety of specialty shops. Today Brillion is home to approximately 2,937 residents.

## CHILTON (COUNTY SEAT)

Chilton, originally known as Stantonville, was settled in 1845 by Moses Stanton. Stanton constructed a sawmill which began to draw new residents and in 1853 the community was organized and renamed Chillington. Its name was then shortened to Chilton and the community was selected as the county seat and incorporated in 1877. Schools, churches and businesses were established which included a newspaper office, fire department, hotels, manufacturing shops, breweries, flour mills, general stores and specialty shops. Today Chilton is home to approximately 3,708 residents.

## HARRISON

Harrison was first known as Lima when it was established in 1853. As the area began to grow, its name was changed to Harrison in 1858 and the first town hall was constructed in 1868. Railroad expansion allowed for development and its proximity to Lake Winnebago attracted many new residents. Today Harrison is home to approximately 10,839 residents.

## NEW HOLSTEIN

In 1848 New Holstein was settled by German immigrants and its name was derived from Schleswig-Holstein, the area from which most settlers arrived. Early industry was led by agriculture and manufacturing as many residents raised potatoes, wheat and barley. Today New Holstein is home to approximately 3,301 residents.

## STOCKBRIDGE

Located near the shores of Lake Winnebago, Stockbridge was established in 1844 and its name was derived from the Stockbridge Indians who lived in the area. Its location near Lake Winnebago made the community a prime location for shipping grain and agricultural products. Today Stockbridge is home to approximately 1,383 residents.



## Outagamie County History (Appleton, County Seat)

Outagamie was founded in 1850 and is located in the east-central part of Wisconsin. The County Seat is Appleton, WI. The early settlers of the area were the Menomonee, Outagamie & Winnebago tribes. Today Outagamie County is home to approximately 177,155 residents.

## SEYMOUR

The City of Seymour was founded in 1868 and was named Governor Horatio Seymour. The first settlers were William and John Ausbourne. Today Seymour is home to approximately 3,451 residents.

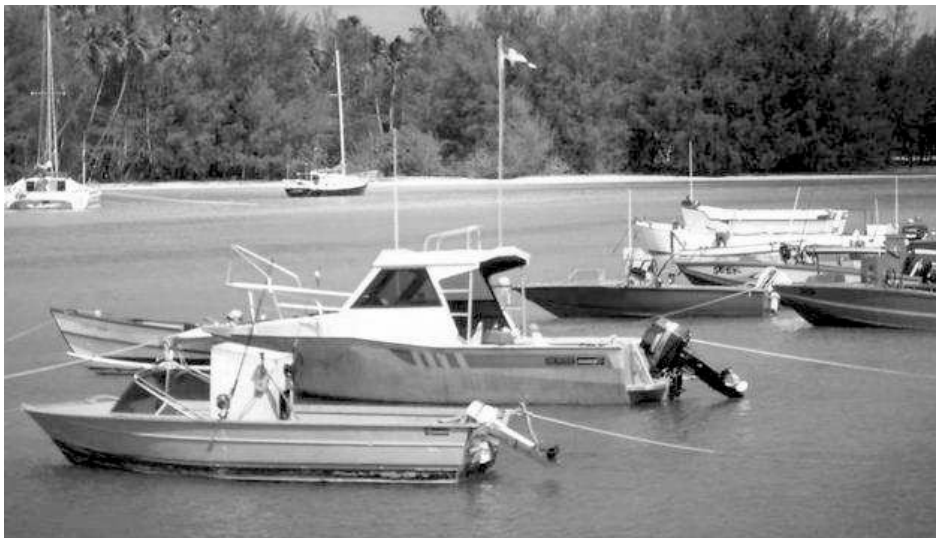

# Boating Safety

## Operating Watercraft

**Follow these guidelines to help prevent and prepare for capsizing, swamping, or someone falling overboard.**

Make sure that you and your passengers are wearing life jackets while the boat is moving.

Attach the ignition safety lanyard to your wrist, clothes, or life jacket.

Don't allow anyone to sit on the gunwale, bow, seat backs, motor cover, or areas not designed for seating. Also, don't let anyone sit on pedestal seats when craft is not in idle.

Don't overload your boat. Balance the load of passengers and gear stored on-board.

Keep your center of gravity low by not allowing people to stand up or move around while craft is in motion.

In small boats, don't allow anyone to lean beyond the gunwale.

Turn boat at slow rates of speed.

Secure the anchor line to the bow, never to the stern.

Don't risk operating water craft in rough conditions or bad weather.

# Boating Safety

## Flotation Devices



### **Offshore Life Jackets - Type 1:**

For rough or remote waters where rescue may take awhile. Provide the most buoyancy, excellent for flotation, turns most unconscious persons face up in the water.



### **Near-Shore Vests - Type 2:**

Good for calm waters when quick assistance or rescue is likely. Turns some unconscious wearers face up in the water, but not as efficiently as offshore life jackets.



### **Flotation Aids - Type 3:**

Vests or full-sleeved jackets good for calm waters when quick assistance is likely. Not for rough waters. They will not turn most unconscious persons face up. Used for sports, such as water-skiing. Some inflate in water.



### **Unwearable / Throwable Devices - Type 4:**

Cushions and ring buoys designed to be thrown to someone in trouble. Type 4 is not designed to be worn. Not for rough waters - not for anyone unable to hold on to it.



### **Special Use - Type 5:**

Vests, hybrids/others designed for specific activities, for example windsurfing, kayaking, water-skiing. Some Type 5 devices inflate when entering the water. To be acceptable, Type 5 must be used in compliance with their label instructions.

**All watercraft must have at least one** Coast Guard Approved Type 1, 2, 3 or 5 flotation device that is the proper size for each person on board or being towed.

**All devices must** be in good condition and easily accessible.

**Children under age 10 must wear a device** when on board a boat that is underway unless:

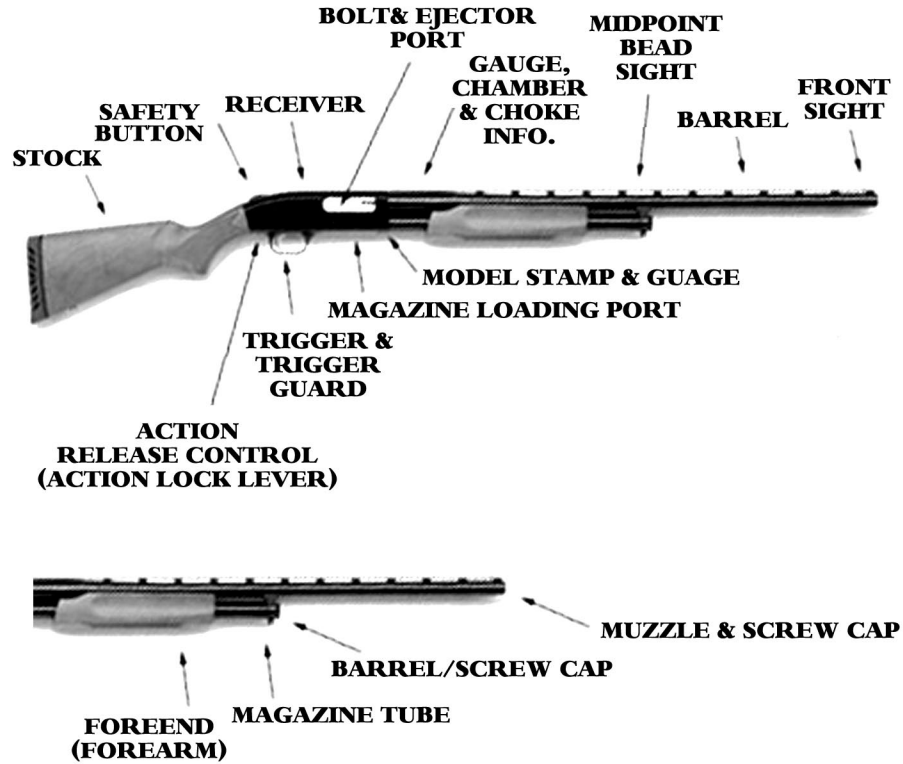
in an enclosed cabin or below deck or on an anchored boat that is being used for swimming or diving or passenger craft with a licensed captain.

**Along with the above** at least one approved Type 4 must be on board boats 16 ft. or longer (except canoes and kayaks) and immediately available.

**A Coast Guard approved Type 5 device may be substituted** for any other Coast Guard approved device if it meets the same requirements and is noted on the label.

**Anyone riding a jet ski or other Personal Water Craft** must wear an approved -non inflating flotation device, as well as anyone being towed by a water craft.

# Hunting Safety



*All hunters should consider taking an advanced hunter education class to learn the latest hunting techniques along with tips on coming home alive.*

*Here are five suggestions for a safe and successful hunting experience:*

1. Get a detailed map of the area you are hunting, review it before you leave, and carry it with you in the field.
2. Carry a compass and know how to use it. Decide ahead of time the direction to head for if you get lost or disoriented.
3. Weather can change quickly in Wisconsin, so hunters should carry a simple survival kit and be prepared for an unexpected overnight stay in the field. The survival kit should contain a rope, a knife, water, waterproof matches, an emergency shelter, and first aid supplies.
4. If you are on the water, make sure to wear a personal flotation device (life preserver).
5. Know your hunting partners' physical and emotional limitations, as well as your own, and don't push your partners or yourself beyond those limits.

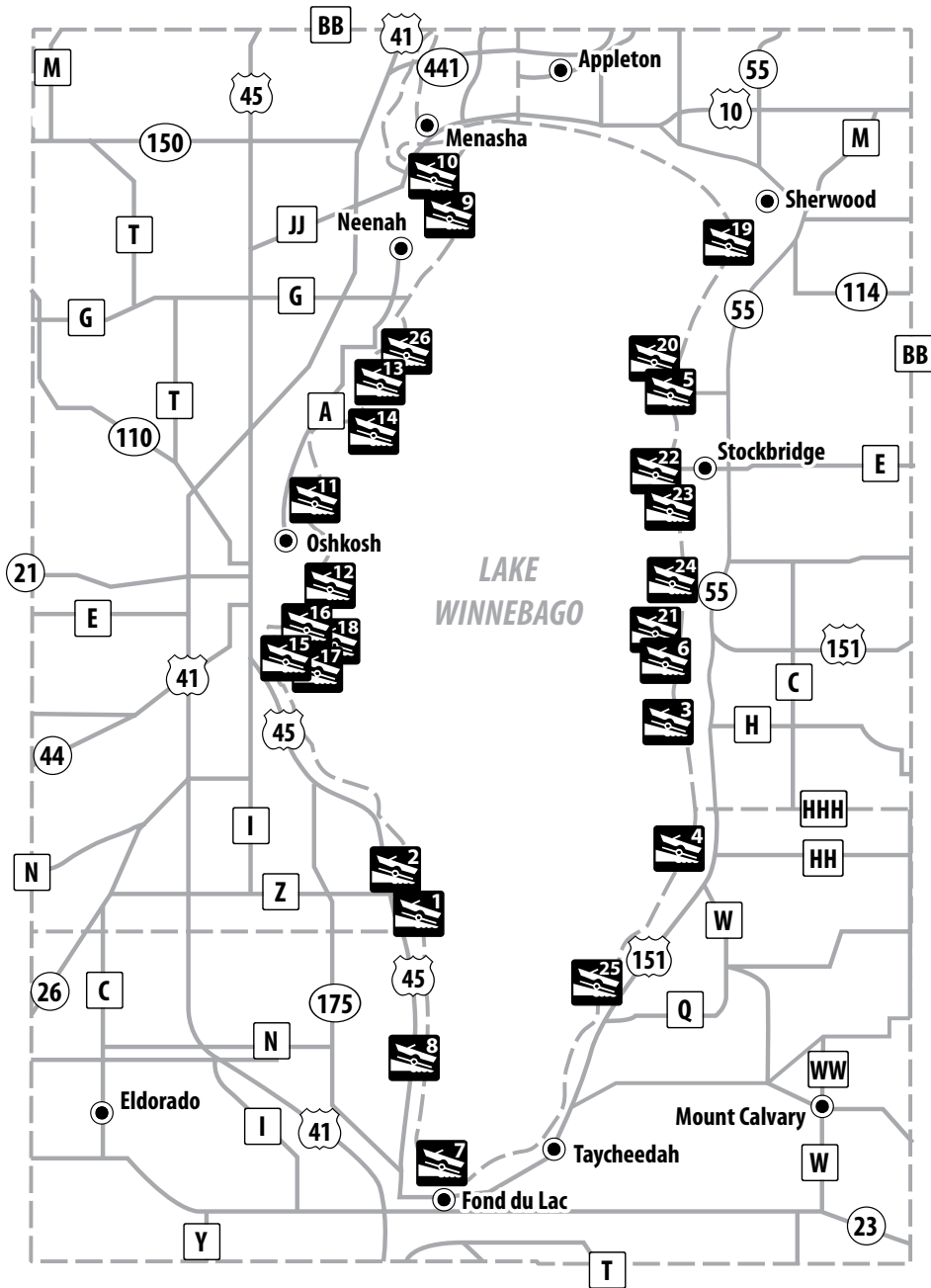

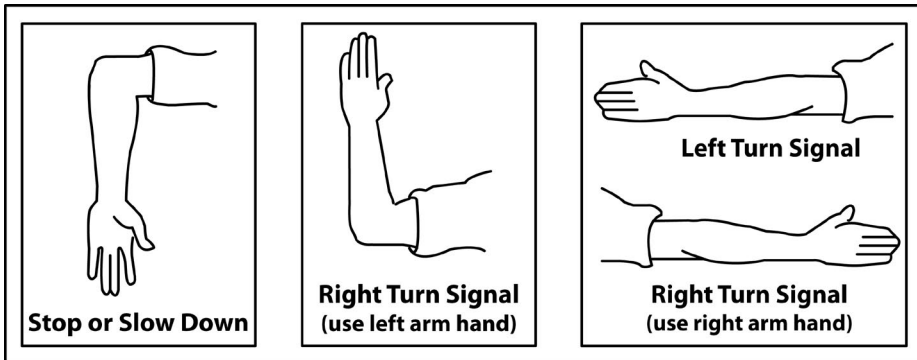

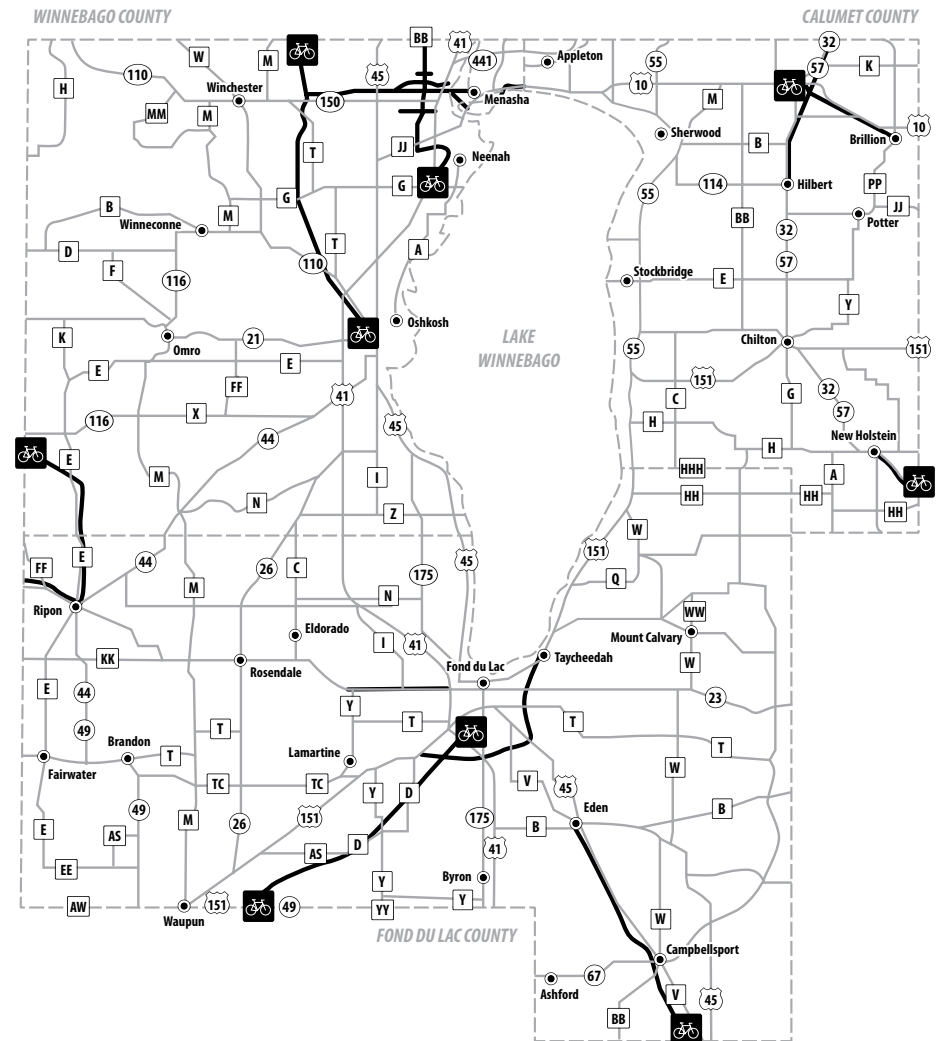

# Bicycle Safety

- Always wear a properly fitting bike helmet as most serious injuries are to the head.
- Be sure your handlebars, seat and wheels fit snugly.
- Keep your bike in good shape by checking and oiling your chain, making sure your brakes work properly and maintaining your tire pressure.
- Always ride with both hands on the handlebars except when doing turn signals.
- When leaving a driveway, curb or alleyway always stop and check for traffic in both directions.
- Cross only at intersections.
- Use the crosswalk to walk your bike across busy intersections and follow the traffic signals.
- Never ride against traffic. Travel in the same direction as the cars.
- Whenever you can, use bike routes and avoid busy streets.
- Don't ride near parked cars as doors can open and cause accidents.
- Obey all traffic signs and traffic lights.
- When biking with friends, ride in a single file.
- Always pass other bikers or pedestrians on the left and say "On your left!" to make your presence known.
- Always use bicycle hand signals to alert traffic of your changing direction.

# ATV Safety

- Read the owner's manual and know your vehicle thoroughly.
- Check your vehicle before you ride.
- Wear protective equipment and clothing.
- Don't lend your vehicle to unskilled riders.
- Supervise young or inexperienced riders.
- Never carry a passenger on vehicles meant for one rider.
- Do not operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Drive at speeds that are appropriate to trail conditions.
- Stay to the right on trails.
- Stay away from thin ice, open water and wetlands
- Know the weather forecast.
- Make sure headlights and taillights work properly.
- Maintain safe distances between other riders.
- Reduce your speed when riding at night.
- Yield to other motor vehicles and trail users.
- Young or beginning riders are encouraged to take a safety training course.



# Snowmobile Safety

Do not consume alcohol or take drugs prior to or during your snowmobile trip. Doing so increases your chances of injury or death.

Slow down and don't cut to the inside of the trail corners. It's dangerous and illegal.

If you snowmobile at night, don't override your lights.

Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone.

Drowning is one of the causes of many snowmobile fatalities. Whenever possible, avoid the ice.

Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for operating a snowmobile.

Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and other debris.

Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile.

Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before.

Know the weather forecast, especially the ice and snow conditions.

Be sure your snowmobile is in top-notch mechanical condition throughout the months of use.

Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving. Thoroughly read the manual that accompanies the snowmobile.

Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. That is not the conduct of a sportsman. Report such violations to the nearest law enforcement officer.

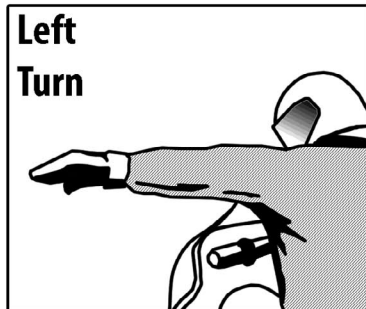
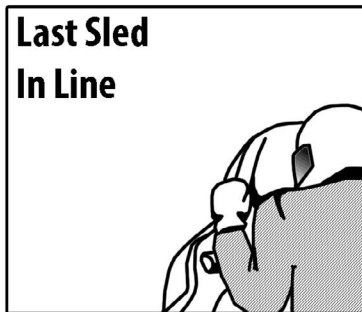
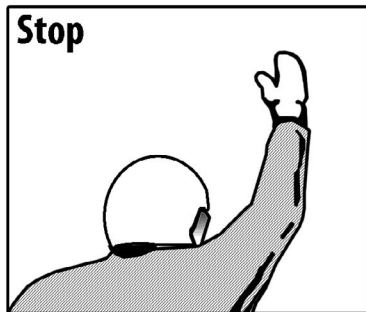
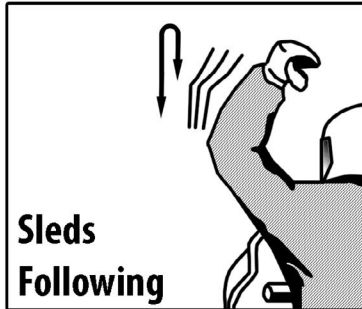
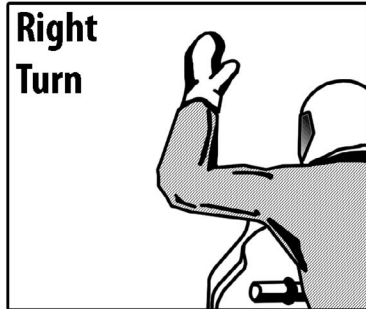
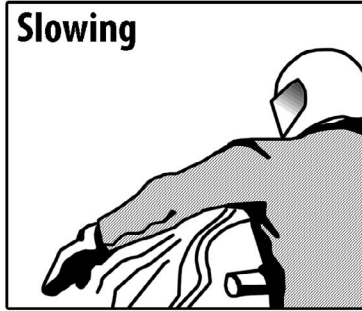

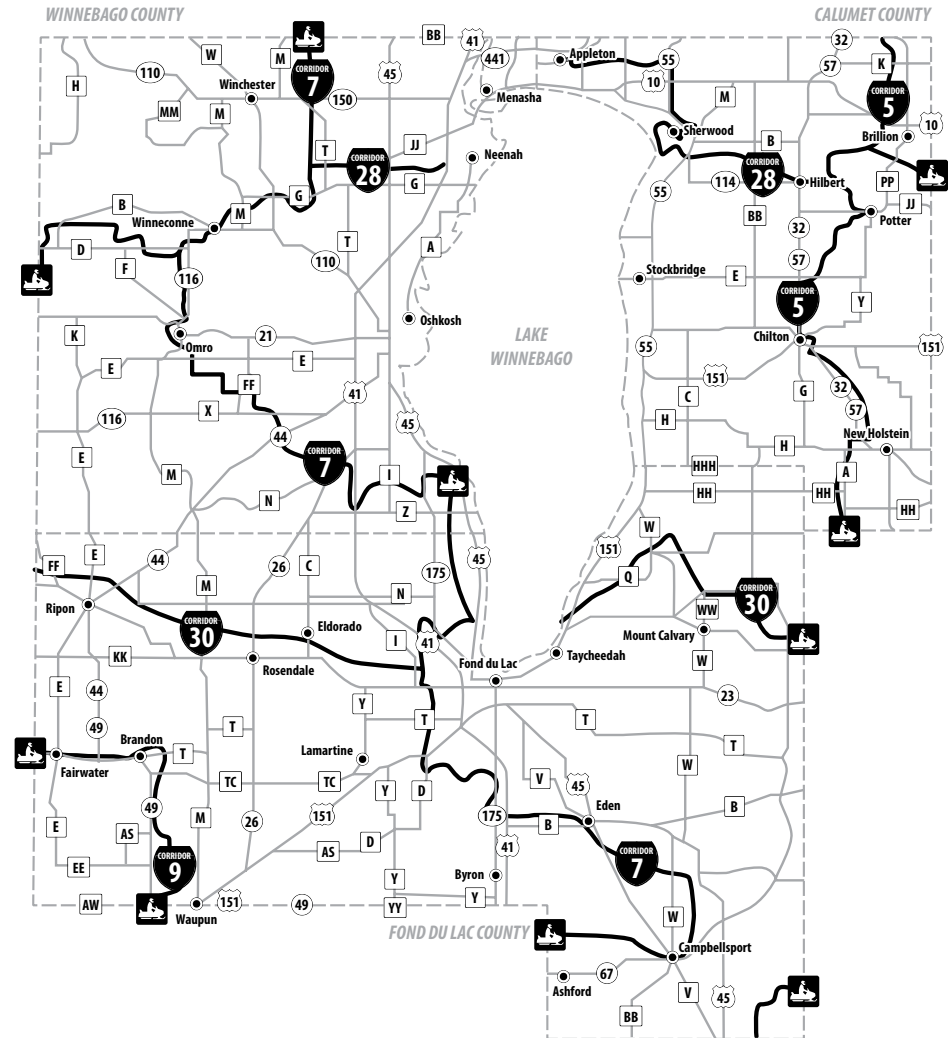
# Snowmobile Safety

Be sure to give easy to see and clear hand signals when snowmobiling. Hand signals should never be subtle, but always deliberate.

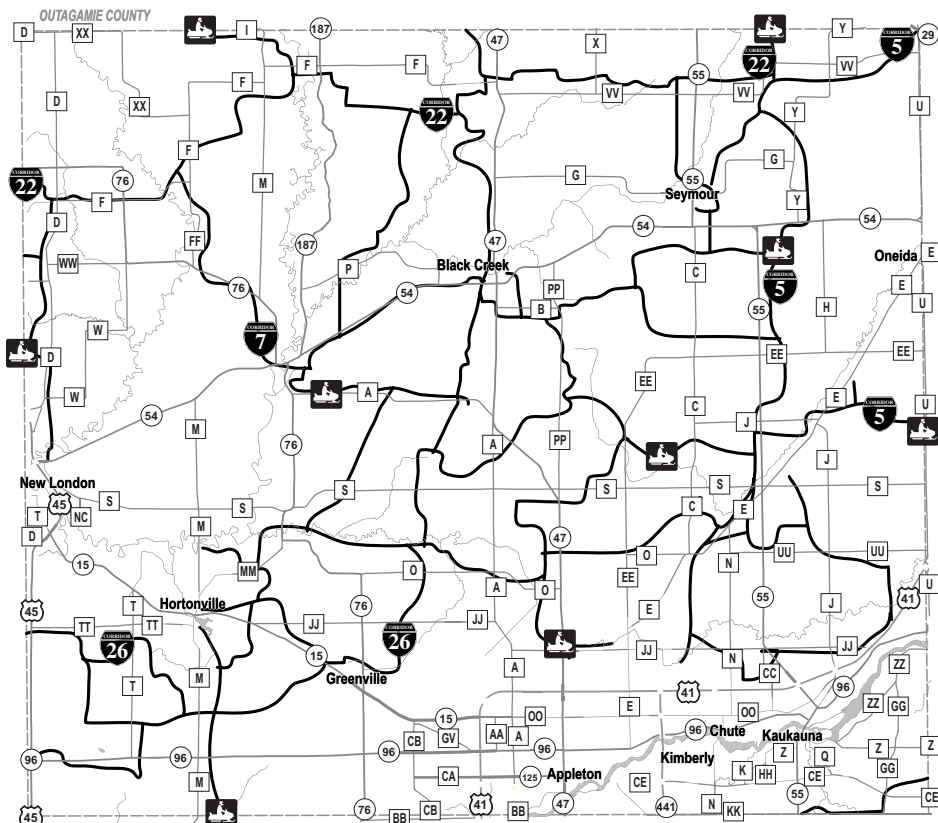


## Lake Winnebago Snowmobile Trails

# ⊕ Emergency First-Aid Tips ⊕

## FIRST AID FOR CPR & HEART ATTACK

### CPR

CPR is to be administered when a person is not breathing or has no pulse. Be quick to act by remembering the A,B,C's: Airway, Breathing & Circulation.

### Airway:

Place the person on a firm surface, on their back. Kneel next to the person's neck and shoulders. Open the person's airway by tilting back the head and lifting the chin.

### Breathing:

With the head tilted and chin lifted, pinch the nostrils shut and cover the person's mouth with yours. Give two slow breaths.

### Circulation:

Find the hand position on the center of the breastbone. Place the heel of your hand on that position, with your other hand on top of the first hand. Use your upper body weight to push down. Give two compressions per second. Compress the chest at a rate equal to 100/minute. Perform 30 compressions at this rate. Repeat until an ambulance arrives.

### HEART ATTACK

Symptoms of a heart attack may include any of the following:

- Uncomfortable pressure, fullness or squeezing pain in the center of the chest.
- Expanded pain in the upper abdomen.
- Shortness of breath.
- Pain or numbness in either arms, shoulders, neck, jaw or teeth.
- Dizziness or fainting.
- Nausea and sweating.

**If you or someone else may be having a heart attack - follow these steps immediately:**

- **DIAL 911**
- **Chew and swallow Aspirin (unless you are allergic/not allowed to)**
- **Take Nitroglycerin (only if prescribed)**
- **Begin CPR if the person is unconscious**

# ⊕ *Emergency First-Aid Tips* ⊕

## *FIRST AID FOR BURNS & CHOKING*

### **BURNS**

**For minor 1st and 2nd degree burns smaller than 3" in diameter:** Cool the Burn. Run cool water over the burned area for 5 minutes, or until the pain diminishes. Never put ice on a burn!

#### **Bandage the burn with sterile gauze:**

It is important to use loosely wrapped gauze. This will avoid pressure and the bandage protects blisters. NEVER put lotions, vaseline, ointments or butter on burn. Do not break any blisters, which can cause infection.

#### **Take Aspirin, Ibuprofen, Naproxen or Acetaminophen to relieve pain:**

Minor burns usually heal with these basic treatments. Be aware for signs of infection which may include: increased pain, redness, fever, swelling or oozing. If symptoms develop, seek medical help. Avoid tanning the burned area for at least a year. Protect the area with sunscreen outdoors. Avoid giving aspirin to children.

***For 3rd degree burns/all major burns - DIAL 911***

***DO NOT run cold water over large severe burns - this can cause shock.***

***DO NOT remove burnt clothing.***

***Check for signs of breathing/coughing/movement.***

***If there are no signs of breathing begin CPR.***

***Elevate burned areas above heart level, if possible.***

***Cover the burn(s) with cool, sterile, moist bandages, towels or cloth.***

### **CHOKING**

Most people clutch at their throats when choking, an obvious symbol for help. However, if a person isn't giving that signal, be alert for these indications. Inability to talk, difficulty breathing or noisy breathing, inability to cough forcefully, skin/lips/nails turning blue, loss of consciousness.

The Red Cross recommends a "five-and-five" method for first aid: First give five blows between the person's shoulders with the heel of your hand. Second, perform the Heimlich maneuver (abdominal thrusts) five times. Alternate between five back blows and five abdominal thrusts until the blockage is dislodged.

## *FIRST AID FOR INSECT BITES/ANAPHYLAXIS & POISON SAFETY*

### **INSECT BITES/ANAPHYLAXIS**

**Anaphylaxis is a severe allergic reaction from insect bites (latex, food and drug allergies can also cause Anaphylaxis). Typical symptoms include hives, the swelling of lips or eyes, swollen throat, drop in blood pressure, light headedness, confusion, nausea or diarrhea. If someone is having an allergic reaction from an insect bite with these symptoms:**

#### **CALL 911.**

**Administer emergency prescription medication.** See if the person is carrying special emergency allergy medicine and give it to them according to the directions.

#### **Loosen tight clothing.**

**Lay the person down.** The person should lay down on their back with feet elevated. Turn them on their side if they are vomiting or bleeding from their mouth to prevent them from choking.

**If they are not breathing - administer CPR.** Most insect bite reactions are mild and cause no allergic reaction. If stung by a bee, use a straight edged object, like a credit card, to scrape away the stinger. Don't use tweezers - they can pinch more venom out of the stinger. Apply an ice pack to the area and take an over the counter pain reliever.

### **POISON PREVENTION**

**Teach your children about poison and how it can look like a food or drink. They should always ask an adult before eating or drinking anything. Have them learn the poison control phone number: 1-800-222-1222 and keep it programmed or posted near all your phones. Here are some prevention tips.**

**Lock up your poisons and medications.** Keep them out of the reach of children, lock them up if possible. Make sure your children understand that medicine is not candy.

**Follow directions carefully.** Read your labels. Be sure to use and store all poisons and medications properly according to recommendations.

**Keep your pets safe from household chemicals, too.** Don't allow pets near areas that have just been cleaned with chemicals, such as freshly mopped floors or bleached bathtubs and sinks. Clean up any antifreeze/coolant spills. Pets like the flavor but they can die if they ingest it. Store poisonous foods or plants in areas that your pets cannot access. Call your local emergency veterinary hospital if you believe your pet has been poisoned.

# Safety Tips for Parents & For Kids

---

## PARENTS:

- Teach your kids that an emergency is when you need help from a doctor, a police officer or a firefighter.
- Designate a safe place by your house that a child can go to if they need help right away.
- Have your kids memorize your address and phone numbers. They should also know your full name and where you work.

## KIDS:

### FIRE SAFETY

- If you or someone else is on fire - remember to STOP, DROP and ROLL. Wrap a blanket on the person to help put out the fire.
- If there is a fire, leave the house as fast as you can! Crawl on the floor to avoid smoke and if the door is hot, don't open it - find another way out.
- Learn all the fire exits in your house. Assign a safe place outside for everyone to meet in case of a fire emergency.

### HOME ALONE

- Never tell anyone that you are home alone.
- If someone calls and ask for your mom and dad, tell them "They cannot come to the phone right now, can you please call back later?"
- Do not answer the door, unless it is someone that you know your parents have okay'd them to come over.
