*K*nown for having rich, fruitful, soil, Pembina county was a huge glacial lake for around 5,000 years. The lake eventually dried up and left the sediments behind. Years later, after bison grazing and Native settlements, Pembina county was the first organized county of what was to become the state of North Dakota in 1867. Cass, Traill, Grand Forks, Steele, most of Nelson and Walsh and parts of Richland, Barnes and Ransom counties were all part of the original settlement. 1871, Pembina county nearly doubled in size acquiring land to the South and West. In 1873 Pembina county was downsized by almost one and a third of it's size. Again in 1885 it lost land to Cavalier County and remains that size today. Pembina county was named after the Chippewa word for the high bush cranberry, which flourished along the Pembina river. The County Seat is Cavalier. Pembina county is now home to around 7,200 people.

Cavalier (County Seat)

Pembina county's county seat, Cavalier was founded in 1875 by Charles Cavileer. Years later, it became the county seat, in 1911. The city Motto is "4 seasons, many reasons". It is home to approximately 1,302 people.

Drayton

Founded in 1878 Drayton has a total area of .65 sq miles. Draytons nickname is "The baseball capitol of the North." In 1958, Governor John Davis declared Drayton the baseball capitol of North Dakota. From 1958-1963 the High School in Drayton won the State baseball championship. They also won the American Legion class A championship in 1958 & 1962 making Drayton the smallest town to win both state & regional class A titles. Drayton is now home to around 824 people.

Pembina

Pembina (pronounced PEM-bih-naw) was first claimed by the French as a result of explorations by French-Canadian Pierre de la Verendrye and his sons who explored the area in 1738. It served as county seat from 1867 to 1911. The first firm date in history was in 1797, when a Northwest Company fur trader established the first trading post named Fort Panbian. In 1851 the US established its first post office in Pembina. A school was built in 1875 and remained in use until 1881. The city is home to around 592 residents.

Walhalla

Walhalla is the second oldest town in North Dakota. Established in 1845 as a fur trading post. David Thompson built the North West Company fur trading company a mile Northeast of town in 1797. Four years later Thompson relocated a mile East of town and constructed a new building for his company. Also, Norman Kittson established the Kittson Trading Post in town in 1843, adding to the local industry. It is now the oldest building in North Dakota. Walhalla is now home to around 996 residents.





Walsh County was named in honor of George H. Walsh (1845–1913), a newspaperman and politician in Grand Forks. In 1881 Grafton became the county seat of Walsh. Walsh County's first settler was named Alexander Henry, an employee of the Northwest Fur Trading Company. They came to secure pelts from the Chippewa Indians in 1800. Beaver fur felt was in high demand in the East and in Europe because of its ability to shape well. Henry built the first settlement in Walsh County in 1801. Alexander Henry was the first to bring many things to Walsh County including horses, bridges, cultivated crops and British Flags. Henry married a Chippewa chief's daughter and later went on to build the Red River ox cart that became the Valley's freight wagons for over 50 years. As of 2010 Walsh County's population was 11,119.

Edinburg

Located in Northeast North Dakota, the town of Edinburg is a genuine "throw-back" to the 50's with modern day etiquette. All 196 citizens strive to maintain its pristine cleanliness, well-kept yards and beautiful homes.

Grafton (County Seat)

Built off of the railroad that went through the territory, Grafton's foundation was laid in 1881. At this time Grafton was also named the county seat. The city was named after Grafton County in New Hampshire, where its early settlers were originally from. Grafton is home to approximately 4,284 residents making it the 13th largest city in North Dakota.

Hoople

Hoople's nickname is "Tatertown" and was founded in 1889. Hoople was named after an early settler Alan Hoople. Hoople is currently home to approximately 242 residents.

Park River

Park River was founded in 1884 and is located in the Red River Valley in Northeastern ND. Park River is known for its pride in agriculture. With lush fields of potatoes, small grains, sugar beets, edible beans, sunflowers, canola and corn, the area has some of the best agricultural land in the world. Park River is now home to approximately 1,403 residents.

Pisek

Pisek means "sand" in Czech. The city was named after a sand ridge located nearby. It is home to approximately 106 residents and was founded in 1882.



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About one tenth of Ramsey County's surface is covered in water. The water is exceedingly clear and varies in great depth across the county. The greatest depths of these lakes reach 100 feet or more. The first occupation in the region was a military operation in 1865 that was led by General Sully. Sully arrived from Sioux City, Iowa with a force consisting of the Thirtieth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, the Sixth and Seventh Iowa cavalry, as well as many others. In 1867 General Terry, who had been appointed commander of the Dakota department, arrived and started the construction of government buildings. At first these buildings were constructed of wood, but later were replaced with more substantial buildings made of brick. The post is considered to be one of the best constructed buildings of its time in the northwest, and presents a spectacular appearance. Devils Lake is the County Seat. Today Ramsey County is home to approximately 11,451 residents.

Churchs Ferry

Churchs Ferry was established in 1886. It has since been swallowed up by the expansion of Devils Lake. Churchs Ferry is the smallest City in Ramsey County. It is home to approximately 12 people.

Crary

Crary is named after William Crary. He is the present owner of most of the encompassing land and is now home to approximately 144 residents.

Devils Lake (County Seat)

Devils Lake is named after the nearby body of water, Devils Lake. The first house was constructed in 1882. After the survey in 1883 it was named Creelsburg and later changed to Creel City, named after the surveyor, Heber M. Creel. In 1884 it was renamed once again to Devils Lake and is now home to nearly 7, 231 people.

Edmore

Edmore was founded in 1901. It is known to have large climate changes year round. There are no bodies of water in this region. Edmore is now home to approximately 181 residents.

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The area of Cavalier County, North Dakota was inhabited by Sioux (Dakota / Lakota) & Chippewa Indigenous tribes when in January of 1873, land was annexed by legislature from Pembina County, the organization of the County was affected in July of 1884. Named for an early settler, Charles Cavileer (Cavalier), who was a customs agent and the first postmaster. By popular vote in May 1885, Cavalier County received fifteen townships from Pembina County. At the time, there were 5,029 people residing in nine sizable townships, according to a census. The names of the nine townships from 1885 are still in use. Township names and the current boundaries were standardized in 1906. The first courthouse was erected in the fall of 1884. It was used for a short while before being abandoned in favor of warmer, more convenient accommodations in a downtown bank. On the current site, a sizable brick courthouse was constructed in 1895. Until the new courthouse was built in 1957–1958, this structure housed county officials. The fur trade was instrumental in relations between the Indigenous & European settlers.

Alsen

In 1905, Alsen was established. 8 miles (13 km) west of Loma on State Route 66 is where you can reach Alsen. Alsen and adjacent Loma each have about the same amount of land within their limits as Minot, although having fewer population.

Dresden

Founded in 1897, Dresden is home to the Cavalier County Museum. Numerous historic buildings in various stages of repair can be seen in Dresden, including the Dyer School, which was relocated there from Milton, the former Langdon Jail, and more.

Langdon (County Seat)

Incorporated in 1885, Langdon was named the county seat in 1884. Since 1886, there has been a post office in Langdon. Robert Bruce Langdon, a politician and railroad administrator, was honored with the naming of the city. A tornado struck on the plains a mile to a mile and a half southeast of Langdon on Memorial Day (then called Decoration Day) 1909, and it later proceeded seven miles to the northwest. The tornado, known as The Vulcan locally, left five people dead and 29 injured. The Great Northern water tank, two elevators, numerous barns, and several feet of railroad track were all damaged by the tornado.

Osnabrock

105 people called Osnabrock home as of the 2020 census. Incorporated as a village in 1903, Osnabrock was established in 1882. It was given the name Osnabruck, Ontario, after James T. Anderson, the town's first postmaster. (Osnabruck was named after the northwest German city of Osnabrück.) The city is entirely landlocked and has a total area of 0.30 square miles (0.78 km²), according to the United States Census Bureau.

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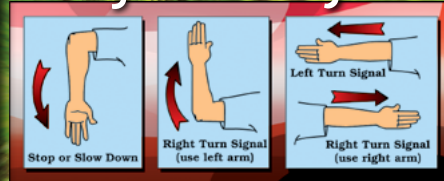
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Be Aware of your Surroundings

- Always wear a properly fitting bike helmet as most serious injuries are to the head.
- Be sure your handlebars, seat and wheels fit snugly.
- Keep your bike in good shape by checking and oiling your chain, making sure your brakes work properly and maintaining your tire pressure.
- Always ride with both hands on the handlebars except when doing turn signals.
- When leaving a driveway, curb or alleyway always stop and check for traffic in both directions.
- Cross only at intersections.
- Use the crosswalk to walk your bike across busy intersections and follow the traffic signals.
- Never ride against traffic. Travel in the same direction as the cars.
- Whenever you can, use bike routes and avoid busy streets.
- Don't ride near parked cars as doors can open and cause accidents.
- Obey all traffic signs and traffic lights.
- When biking with friends, ride in a single file.
- Always pass other bikers or pedestrians on the left and say "On your left!" to make your presence known.
- Always use bicycle hand signals to alert traffic of your changing direction.

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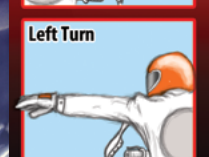
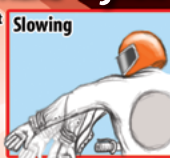
and know your vehicle thoroughly. • Check your vehicle before you ride. • Wear protective equipment and clothing. • Don't lend your vehicle to unskilled riders. • Supervise young or inexperienced riders. • Never carry a passenger on vehicles meant for one rider. • Do not operate under the influence of drugs or alcohol. • Drive at speeds that are appropriate to trail conditions. • Stay to the right on trails. • Stay away from thin ice, open water and wetlands. • Know the weather forecast. • Make sure headlights and taillights work properly. • Maintain safe distances between other riders. • Reduce your speed when riding at night. • Yield to other motor vehicles and trail users. • Young or beginning riders are encouraged to take a safety training course.

SNOWMOBILE SAFETY

- Do not consume alcohol or take drugs prior to or during your snowmobile trip. Doing so increases your chances of injury or death.
- Slow down and don't cut to the inside of the trail corners. It's dangerous and illegal.
- If you snowmobile at night, don't override your lights.
- Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone.
- Drowning is one of the causes of many snowmobile fatalities. Whenever possible, avoid the ice.
- Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for operating a snowmobile.
- Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and other debris.
- Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile.
- Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before.
- Know the weather forecast, especially the ice and snow conditions.
- Be sure your snowmobile is in top-notch mechanical condition throughout the months of use.
- Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving. Thoroughly read the manual that accompanies the snowmobile.
- Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. That is not the conduct of a sportsman. Report such violations to the nearest law enforcement officer.

Snowmobile Hand Signals

Communication is an essential part of safe riding. Hand signals are a practical way to communicate between other riders and traffic. Be sure to give easy to see and clear hand signals when snowmobiling. Hand signals should never be subtle, but always deliberate.

So, You have decided to get a pet...

NOW WHAT??

If you have just rescued / adopted a new fur baby, please it is important to remember the 3-3-3 RULE:

3 Days:

In the first 3 days being in its new home, they will be feeling overwhelmed, scared & unsure of what is going on. They may also be uncomfortable being "themselves", and may not want to eat or drink. They may want to "shut down" or hide under a bed or in a crate, and they will test boundaries.

3 Weeks:

At this point, they may be a lot more comfortable & settling in. Learning a new routine can be overwhelming, so please be patient. By now they may have figured out the new environment & accepted that this may be their FURever home. Their personality traits will start to show, as well as any behavior issue that may be present.

3 Months:

For most fur babies, 3 months is enough time to finally be comfortable and begin to build trust and a true bond. A sense of security may be present & a set routine will help this process.

Please know that this is not the rule with every rescued or adopted pet, as some may need 6 months to a year to adjust & adapt, depending on MANY factors. Age of animal, what type of an environment did they come from?

Drayton North Dakota

Drayton, North Dakota. Other than being referred to as "Catfish Capital of the North", this TINY city holds a hefty title dubbed by the Governor, John Davis in 1958.

"Baseball Capital of North Dakota". If you are curious as to how such a small city (only 0.66 square miles) got one of America's favorite pastimes titles, let me fill you in.

65 years ago, in 1958, the Drayton American Legion (Drayton High School) had a team that became unbeatable for years. These teen aged fellas typically played all class B teams but they plowed their way into class A.....and proceeded to win the Eastern division and then the state tournament in the city of Jamestown. Putting a whoopin' to Fargo, Jamestown & Grand Forks in the division tournament. They then proceeded to go 3-0, beating the home team twice as well as Williston at McElroy park.

That was the first of a 6 year dynasty, amassing a record of 73-1. They beat all of the state's best class A teams earning them a spot in the Legion Region 9 tournament, where they beat both Minneapolis Minnesota's team as well as Sioux Falls South Dakota's twice. This led to their advancement to the section tournament in Hobart, Oklahoma, being the first team in North Dakota to go since 1940.

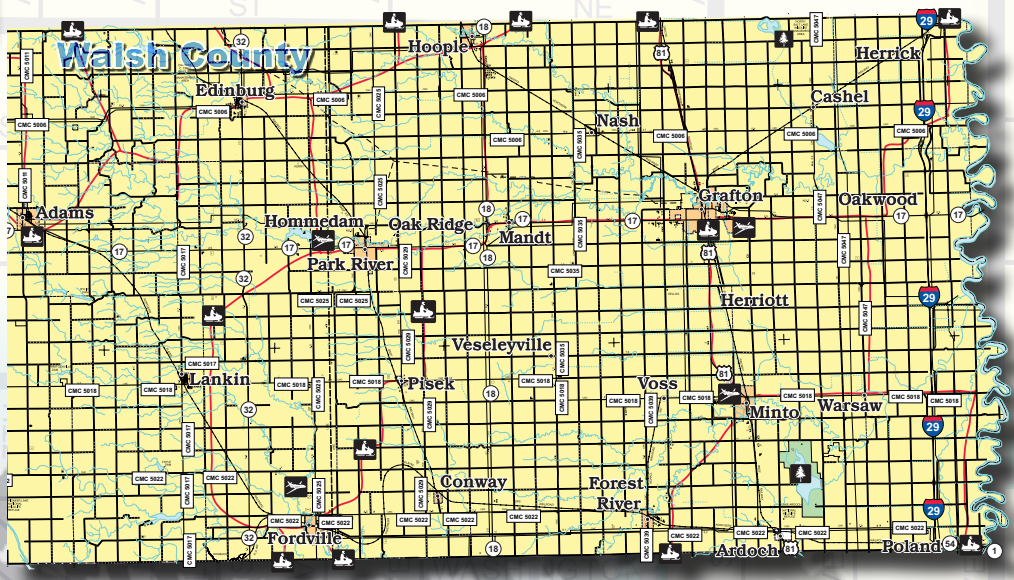
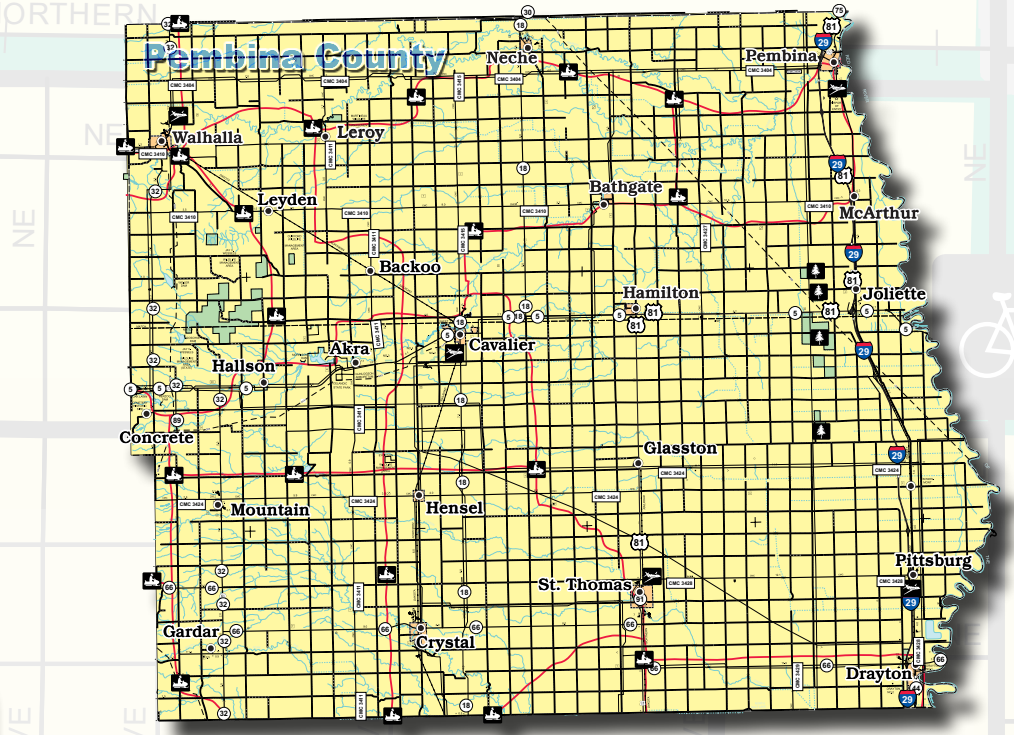
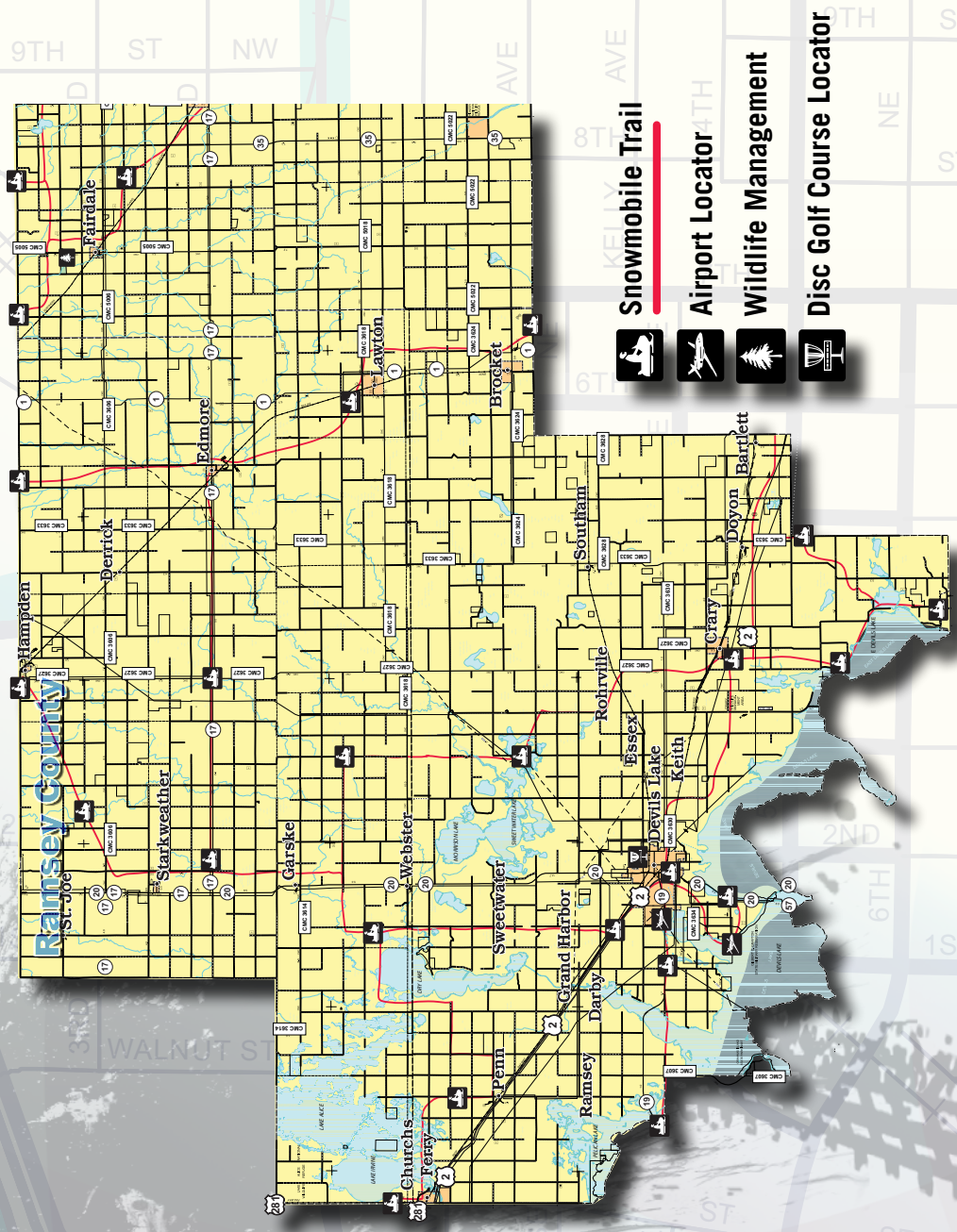
In that tournament, they would go on to lose, twice. That ended their season with an amazing record of 25-2. Losing to a Cincinnati, Ohio team that eventually went on to win the state championship.

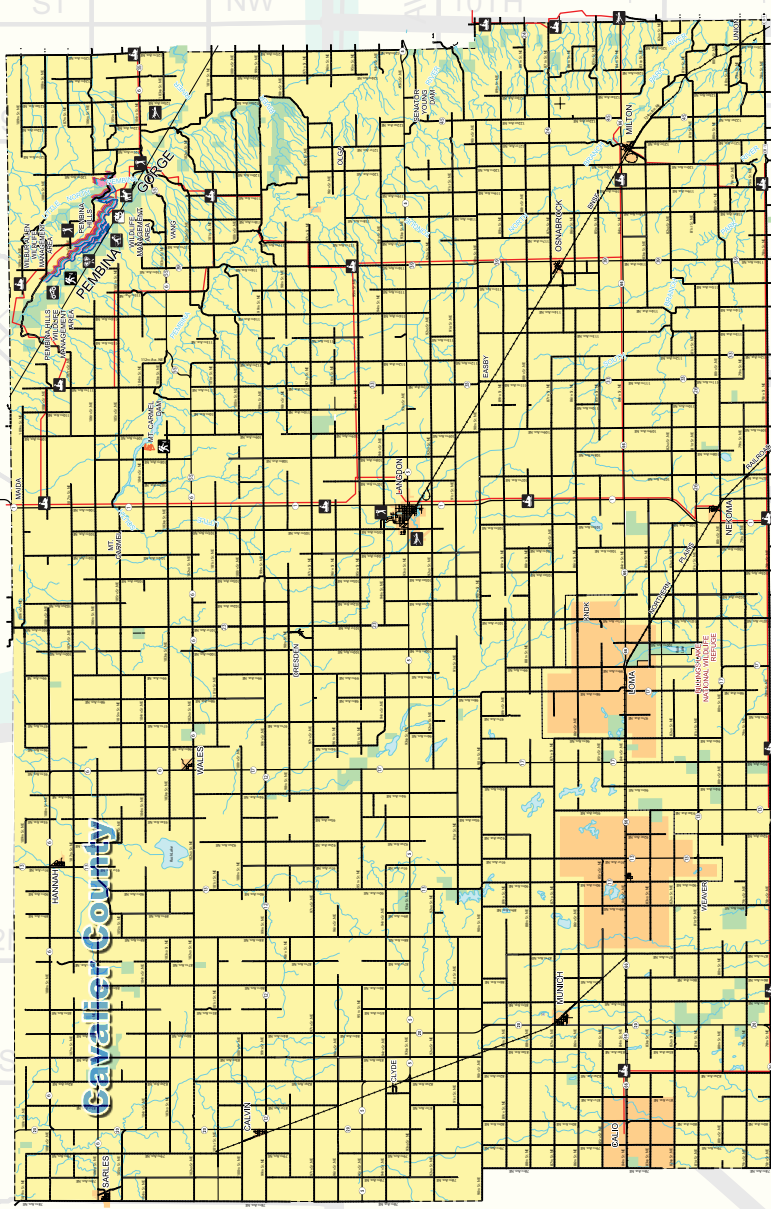
Most, if not all of the guys went on to play college ball, with 2 of them becoming professional baseball players. One went to the New York Yankees, and the other to the Pittsburgh Pirates.

In 2010, the team was inducted into the NDSHOF. If you would like to learn more about the Drayton Dynasty, there is a book titled, "When Cinderella wore Spikes", written by Richard H. Johnson, published in 2009. I understand it is a very well researched and written book.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 Preheat the oven to 375°F (190°C).
- 2 In a small bowl, whisk together the honey, soy sauce, olive oil, apple cider vinegar, garlic, salt, and pepper.

Fall Lawn Care
