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
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BABCOCK PARK

4654 Maple Grove Dr. | Verona Located near the Ice Age Trail Junction Area, Badger Prairie Park features a picnic shelter, ball fields, playground equipment, hiking trails, bicycle trails and an aeromodeling field.

BRIGHAM PARK

3160 Co. Rd. F | Blue Mounds Located near the Wisconsin River Valley, Brigham Park features a campground, picnic shelters, volleyball court, playground equipment and nature trails.

CAM-ROCK COUNTY PARK

68 Co. Hwy. B | Cambridge Located near Koshkonong Creek, Cam-Rock Park features picnic shelters, ball field, playground equipment, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails and bicycle trails.

DONALD COUNTY PARK

1945 Hwy. 92 | Mount Horeb Located near Deer Creek and Frye Feeder, Donald Park features a picnic area, hiking trails and equestrian trails.

FESTGE PARK

4894 Scherbel Rd. | Cross Plains | 608-246-3896 Located near the Black Earth Creek Valley and Salmo Pond, Festge Park features a fishing pier, picnic shelters, ball field, playground equipment and hiking trails.

FISH CAMP PARK

3359 Fish Camp Rd. | McFarland Located near Lake Kegonsa and the Yahara River, Fish Camp Park features a boat launch, fishing pier, fish cleaning station and picnic areas.

GOODLAND COUNTY PARK

2844 Waubesa Ave. | Madison Located near Lake Waubesa, Goodland Park features a boat launch, picnic shelters, ball field, playground equipment, volleyball court, tennis court and a swimming area.

HALFWAY PRAIRIE SCHOOL

9770 Hwy. 19 | Cross Plains Located near Black Earth, Halfway Prairie School is Dane County's oldest rural elementary school and features authentic restoration and public tours.

INDIAN LAKE COUNTY PARK

8183 Hwy. 19 | Cross Plains Located near Indian Lake, Indian Lake Park features a picnic shelter, boat launch, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails, pet exercise area and a historic chapel.

JENNI & KYLE PRESERVE

925 Post Rd. | Madison Located near the Madison Area Rehabilitation Center, the Jenni and Kyle Preserve provides handicapped accessible fishing and picnic areas, wheelchair swings and spring fed ponds for children ages 14 and under or persons with disabilities.

LAFOLLETTE COUNTY PARK

2195 Williams Dr. | Stoughton Located near Lake Kegonsa and the Yahara River, LaFollette Park features a canoe launch and picnic areas.

MCCARTHY YOUTH & CONSERVATION PARK

4841 Co. Hwy. TT | Cottage Grove The McCarthy Youth and Conservation Park features hiking trails, equestrian trails and picnic areas. Upon completion it will feature a campground.

MENDOTA PARK

5133 Co. Hwy. M | Middleton

Located near Governor Nelson State Park, Mendota Park features a campground, picnic shelters, boat launch, ball field, tennis court, basketball court, playground equipment and a swimming area.

LEWIS NINE SPRINGS E-WAY

1949 Moorland Rd. | Madison Located near Lake Farm Park, Nine Springs E-Way features hiking trails, bicycle trails, cross-country ski trails and picnic areas.

PHEASANT BRANCH CREEK CONSERVANCY

4864 Pheasant Branch Rd. | Middleton Located near Lake Mendota, Pheasant Branch Creek Conservancy features a Native American burial ground, hiking trails and panoramic views of the Capitol Building.

PRAIRIE MORAINE PARK

6679 Wesner Ln. | Verona Located near the Johnstown Moraine, Prairie Moraine Park features hiking trails and a pet exercise area.

RILEY-DEPPE PARK

870 Hwy. 19 | Marshall Located near the Maunesha River, Riley-Deppe Park features a boat launch, picnic shelter and playground equipment.

SCHUMACHER FARM

5682 Hwy. 19 | Waunakee Located near Waunakee, Schumacher Farm features an outdoor museum showcasing farm life in the 1920s and 30s, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails and picnic areas.

STEWART LAKE COUNTY PARK

3106 Co. Hwy. JG | Mt. Horeb Located near Stewart Lake, Stewart Park features a boat launch, picnic shelter, playground equipment and hiking trails.

TOKEN CREEK PARK

6200 Williamsburg Way | Deforest Located near Burke, Token Creek Park features a campground, fishing pier, picnic shelters, volleyball courts, 18 hole disc golf course, playground equipment, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails, equestrian trails, snowmobile trails and a pet exercise area.

VIKING PARK

2525 Co. Hwy. B | Stoughton

Located near the Yahara River, Viking Park features a picnic shelter, shoreline fishing, hiking trails, bicycle trails, snowmobile trails and a pet exercise area.

WALKING IRON PARK

6064 Beckman Rd. | Mazomanie Located near Mazomanie, Walking Iron Park features hiking trails, equestrian trails, snowmobile trails and picnic areas.

WILLIAM G. LUNNEY LAKE FARM COUNTY PARK

4330 Libby Rd. | Madison

Located near the Capital Springs Centennial State Park and Recreation Area, Lake Farm Park features a campground, boat launch, fishing pier, fish cleaning station, picnic shelters, ball field, playground equipment, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails, wildlife pond, over-look tower and the Native American Archaeological Trail.



Rock County Communities



Cocated in South Central Wisconsin, Rock County is named after a large rock in the Rock River and is one of the oldest counties in the state. Native Americans along with early settlers from New England and Europe shaped the area's history. In 1835 the first settlement was made and Rock County was officially founded in 1839 with Janesville selected as the county seat. Settlers began to farm and establish manufacturing centers by utilizing the river to power mills. The mills provided paper, flour, beer, fabrics and various products, and enabled Rock County's economy to become stable and diversified. By 1900 its population had reached 51,203 and the area continued to grow and develop. Today Rock County is home to approximately 160,155 residents.

BELOIT

During the 1800's, Native Americans of the Winnebago tribe lived where the Rock River and Turtle Creek joined. In 1832, a French fur trapper by the name of Joseph Thiebault arrived and began trading with the Indians. In 1836, Caleb Blodgett, a New York native, purchased land from Thiebault which became Beloit. The name Beloit is believed to be a French word meaning "handsome ground" and was spelled after "Detroit," which many settlers saw as a city of progress, growth and trade. Beloit was incorporated as a village in 1836 and as a city in 1856. Today Beloit is home to approximately 36,120 residents.

CLINTON

Settlements were established in 1837 as pioneers were drawn to the area for its lush soil, ample timber and abundant streams. In 1842 Clinton was organized, held its first town meeting and a year later, five sectors of present day Turtle were appropriated to it. The post office was then founded and named "Ogden." The area was known as Ogden until 1864 when it was changed back to Clinton. Today Clinton is home to approximately 3,155 residents.

EDGERTON

Attracted by the plentiful berries, wildlife, rich soil and traversable waterways, Indians were the first to settle Edgerton. Pioneers began arriving in the 1840's and the William Bliven family established the first homestead. In 1853 the railroad arrived and the city was named after Benjamin Edgerton, a railroad engineer who worked on the project, in 1859. Edgerton had become "The Tobacco Capital of the World" by 1900 as there were over 50 tobacco warehouses within the city. Today Edgerton is home to approximately 5,278 residents.

EVANSVILLE

As the Indians left the area in 1836, settlers began arriving from the east coast. Evansville was originally called "The Grove" because of the dense forests and was first platted in 1855. As the railroad arrived in 1863, the community was stabilized by planned growth. Farming and manufacturing led the industry and in 1896 Evansville was incorporated. Today Evansville is home to approximately 4,974 residents.

FOOTVILLE

Ezra Foot arrived in 1843 from Connecticut and moved his family to the area in 1845. The community was named in his honor as Foot played an integral role in shaping its history. In 1848 he assisted in writing Wisconsin's Constitution, served as State Senator and was part of the Rock County Agricultural Society, who established the first Rock County Fair in 1851. To aid in the growth of the town, Foot assisted with the arrival of the railroad. Due to the fertile soil, agriculture remained a staple throughout Footville as many farmers were involved in the dairy business. In 1931, Footville was the first to have a lighted baseball field in the country. Today Footville is home to approximately 744 residents.

JANESVILLE (COUNTY SEAT)

Attracted to the fertile soil and ample timber, the first settlers arrived in 1835 and established a post office. As the post office was named Janesville, the area was recognized as such. Using the power of the river, manufacturing led Janesville's industry. Farmers began to utilize the fertile soil to produce a variety of crops. As the railroad arrived, the area began to flourish. Throughout the years, the original natural beauty that appealed to the first settlers has been preserved. Over 2,000 acres of parks lie within the city, giving Janesville the name "Wisconsin's Park Place." Today Janesville is home to approximately 62,522 residents.

MILTON

Settlement began by 1840 and Milton was known as "Prairie du Lac." When the post office was established in 1839, Prairie du Lac was too similar to already established Prairie du Sac, so a town meeting was held. A settler coined the phrase "Paradise Lost" and Milton was named after the poet John Milton, the author of "Paradise Lost." By the 1850's West Milton, a second community one mile west was established. As the railroads crossed, West Milton was changed to Milton Junction and the two communities existed independently until 1967. The community is now widely recognized for the Milton House, one of Wisconsin's only National Historic Landmarks and a documented stop on the Underground Railroad. Today Milton is home to approximately 5,564 residents.

ORFORDVILLE

Because settlers could not agree on a proper town name, J.T. Dodge, the area surveyor, suggested "Orford," after a town in New Hampshire. The post office and railroad station were also named Orford until there was too much postal and travel confusion with the Wisconsin city Oxford. Orford was then renamed Orfordville. The area was part of Spring Valley Township until 1900 when residents requested incorporation. After an election, Orfordville was officially a village and had to split all equipment and debts with Spring Valley. Today Orfordville is home to approximately 1,370 residents.



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Dane County Communities



ane County was established in 1836 as a territorial county and named in honor of Nathan Dane, a lawyer and politician who assisted with the formation of the state of Wisconsin. Fertile soil, ample prairie and access to water made Dane County an ideal area for settlement. Communities were established and the area began to grow as the railroad arrived. Madison was then selected as the county seat and capital of Wisconsin. The first state capitol building was constructed in 1838 and the first county courthouse was built in 1849. By 1900 the population of Dane County had reached 69,435 and almost doubled by 1930 with 112,737 residents. Industry began to include manufacturing, education and agriculture and Dane County continued to prosper. Today Dane County is home to approximately 482,705 residents.

BELLEVILLE

Belleville, French for "beautiful village," was first settled in 1838 by Daniel Webster. A grist mill, dam and sawmill were built along the Sugar River in 1845 by John Frederick and the settlement began to grow. Frederick and John Mitchell platted Belleville in 1850 and named the community in honor of their hometown of Belleville, Ontario. Today Belleville is home to approximately 2,385 residents.

BURKE

Settled in the mid 1800s, Burke was named in honor of Edmund Burke, an Irish politician and Whig party member. By 2036, Burke is expected to merge with Sun Prairie, DeForest and Madison. Today Burke is home to approximately 3,284 residents.

COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove was surveyed in 1834 and grew as a stagecoach stop. Early industry was dominated by agriculture and as the railroad was constructed in 1881, Cottage Grove became a shipping center for farm products. In 1924 the community was incorporated and the development of businesses continued. Today Cottage Grove is home to approximately 6,248 residents.

CROSS PLAINS

Cross Plains was founded in 1847 and as railroad lines were established, settlers began to arrive. A lumberyard, churches, schools, saloons, specialty shops and a post office were built by 1880. In 1920 the nearby communities of Foxville and Christina merged with Cross Plains which was then incorporated into a village. Today Cross Plains is home to approximately 3,538 residents.

DEERFIELD

Named in honor of the abundant wildlife, Deerfield was settled in the mid 1800s. As the rail-road was established, settlement grew and businesses were established. In 1891 Deerfield was incorporated into a village and development continued. Today Deerfield is home to approximately 2,319 residents.

DEFOREST

Deforest was named in honor of its early settler Isaac DeForest who arrived to the area in 1854. The community was platted in 1856 and a post office was soon established. As the railroad arrived in 1872, DeForest continued to grow as businesses were founded. Today DeForest is home to approximately 8,936 residents.

DUNN

Settled in the 1840s, Dunn was named in honor of Chief Justice Charles Dunn of the Territorial Supreme Court. Originally part of Madison and Pleasant Springs, Dunn became a separate town in 1848. Due to the fertile soil and ample prairie, early industry was dominated by agriculture. Today Dunn is home to approximately 5,270 residents.

FITCHBURG

Once part of Rome, Oregon and Dunn, Fitchburg was first settled by the Vroman brothers in 1839. In 1847 the settlement separated and was named Greenfield after the fertile lands found throughout the area. Due to another community named Greenfield, Greenfield was renamed Fitchburg to avoid postal confusion. Fitchburg grew quickly as a railroad and stagecoach stop and by 1900, mills, lumber yards, creameries, general stores and specialty shops were thriving. Today Fitchburg is home to approximately 25,260 residents.

MADISON (COUNTY SEAT)

Founded in 1836 by Federal Judge James Duane Doty, the community was named in honor of President James Madison. With heavy promotion, Doty successfully petitioned the territorial legislature to secure Madison as the state capital of Wisconsin and the seat of Dane County. In 1846 Madison incorporated as a village and as a city in 1856. As the railroad arrived, Madison developed dramatically and by 1900 its population had reached over 10,000. Due to its prime location, Madison has since become an educational, political and manufacturing center. Today Madison is home to approximately 258,054 residents.

MARSHALL

First settled in 1837 along the Maunesha River, Marshall was originally recognized as Bird's Ruins. Renamed Hanchettsville in 1849, the community began to grow as rail lines were built through the area. The settlement was again renamed Marshall in 1861 in honor of Samuel Marshall, a real estate broker. Marshall was incorporated as a village in 1905 and the area continued to grow. Today Marshall is home to approximately 3,862 residents.

MCFARLAND

McFarland was established and named after William H. McFarland in 1856. Due to its proximity to Lake Waubesa, the area attracted many settlers. Ice and fish were harvested and shipped to Chicago. As the railroad arrived McFarland continued to develop and the area became a bedroom community for nearby Madison. Today McFarland is home to approximately 7,808 residents.

Dane County Communities

MIDDLETON

First surveyed by W.B. Slaughter in 1836, the site for Middleton was originally selected to be the state capital of Wisconsin. As the railroad was built, settlement grew near the depot station and the community of Middleton was established and named after a city in Vermont. Middleton developed quickly and by 1900 a variety of businesses including an opera house were established. In 1905 Middleton was incorporated and the community continued to progress. Today Middleton is home to approximately 17,442 residents.

MONONA

Monona was settled in the late 1800s by farmers working the prairies. As development of nearby communities increased, Monona became a popular area for summer homes which became permanent residences. In 1938 Monona was incorporated and the area began to grow dramatically. Today Monona is home to approximately 7,533 residents.

MOUNT HOREB

Once called Horeb's Corners, Mount Horeb was settled in the mid 1800s. George Wright served as the area's first postmaster and chose the name "Mount Horeb" from a scripture passage in 1861. The first general store was established by George Barrows in 1866 and the railroad arrived in 1881, attracting residents. Mount Horeb has since become a popular tourist area and is widely recognized as the Troll Capital of the World. Today Mount Horeb is home to approximately 7,009 residents.

OREGON

First recognized as Rome Corners, Oregon was settled by Bartlet Runey in 1841. Incorporation followed in 1881 and as the railroad arrived, Rome Corners was changed to Oregon in honor of early railway maps that marked the area as such. By 1900 businesses were booming and Oregon continued to thrive. It is now widely recognized as the "Horse Capital of Wisconsin" due to the many horse stables and farms found within the community. Today Oregon is home to approximately 9,231 residents.

PLEASANT SPRINGS

Pleasant Springs was settled in 1848 and named after the many natural springs located in the area. Summer homes were located along the shores of Lake Kegonsa and soon permanent residences took their place. A post office, general stores and specialty shops were established and the area began to grow. Today Pleasant Springs is home to approximately 3,053 residents.







PORK Carnitas TACOS

INGREDIENTS

- 2 lbs pork shoulder, cut into 2-inch cubes
- 1 onion, diced
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 jalapeño pepper, seeded and minced
- 1 tbsp ground cumin
- 1 tbsp chili powder
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1 orange, juice
- 1 lime, juiced
- 1/4 cup **cilantro**, chopped
- Corn tortillas

Toppings of your choice (such as chopped onions, diced tomatoes, sliced avocado, shredded lettuce, sour cream, and salsa)

Enjoy your delicious pork carnitas tacos!

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 In a large pot or Dutch oven, heat some oil over medium-high heat. Add the pork and sear until browned on all sides.
- 2 Add the diced onion, minced garlic, and minced jalapeño pepper to the pot. Cook until the onion is softened and the garlic is fragrant, about 3-5 minutes.
- **3** Add the ground cumin, chili powder, smoked paprika, salt, and black pepper to the pot. Stir to coat the pork and vegetables with the spices.
- 4 Add the orange juice, lime juice, and enough water to cover the pork by about an inch. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to low and simmer, covered, for 2-3 hours or until the pork is very tender.
- **5** Remove the lid and continue to simmer until the liquid has reduced and the pork is browned and crispy on the outside.
- 6 Use two forks to shred the pork into bite-sized pieces. Stir in the chopped cilantro.
- **7** To serve, warm up the corn tortillas and place some of the pork carnitas on each tortilla. Add your desired toppings and serve immediately.
